Catch the R & J's Big Yellow Shuttle downtown as vendors will line the streets with crafts, jewelry, baked goods, clothing, artwork and food starting at 9 a.m.

ing significant damage to our grinder. This repair has proven to be costly for the Borough just after it had undergone regu-

lar maintenance.

Despite our ongoing efforts - including

messaging and camera surveillance – some individuals are not adhering to the Compost Site's use policies. In addition to the metal, our Highway Department has found other harmful debris, such as chain link fence pieces and concrete borders, which can



cause further damage to the grinder.

We cannot stress enough the importance of following the rules... Only yard waste is allowed at the compost area. Your cooperation is essential in keeping this service available for everyone in our community.

Borough Tax Collector

Schuylkill Haven Borough Tax Collector office hours for the remainder of the year are by appointment by calling 570-385-1313 (please leave a message) or 570-990-6821.

I check in at my office in the Recreation and Senior Center, 340 Haven Street, numerous times during the week for messages and mail. Those with questions or needing help can also call the Borough Office at 570-385-2841 and leave a message with the Borough Secretary. The tax office can also be reached by email at taxcollector@schuylkillhaven.org.

For last minute taxpayers, my office will be open the last few days of 2025 - Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Dec. 29-31 - from noon to 4 p.m. for cash or money order payments only.

Borough property tax and per capita tax bills are in the penalty phase, now until the end of December. Any Real Estate or Per Capita bill not paid by then will be turned over to Tax Claim for collection and any additional service fees. Everyone's Per Capita tax amount is \$11 per bill during the penalty period.

Tax bills may be paid by check or money order only. Anyone paying a tax bill after Dec. 14 should pay by cash or money order so that payments can be properly credited by Dec. 31. Keep in mind your tax is not paid until the check clears the bank.

When paying a tax bill, include the proper amount on the check. If the check is incorrect for any reason, it will be returned to the taxpayer.

Water Treatment Plant

Lead and copper are stringently regulated in Pennsylvania by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). So, in an effort to help our residents understand some of the regulations pertaining to lead in drinking water, I looked up a few interesting facts.

After the passage into federal law of the Safe Drinking Water Act, Pennsylvania adopted it in 1984 to establish a "comprehensive program to ensure safe drinking water." In June of 1991, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency issued its final Lead and Copper Rule. Again, Pennsylvania made the rule effective as of December 24, 1994.

The primary objective of this rule is to control lead and copper levels in public drinking water systems through a treatment technique for corrosion control. That rule establishes a lead action level of 0.015 milligram per liter (mg/L) and a copper action level of 1.3 mg/L. An "action level" represents a level at which the water system must take additional action under its control to reduce lead or copper levels.



A little perspective is in order... a milligram per liter is equivalent to a penny in a million dollars.

The drinking water provided to the customers of Schuylkill Haven Borough's Water Department is in a monitoring cycle of 20 water system residences every three years. The last time your drinking water was tested for lead and copper was August 2022 with the 90th percentile results showing 0.00331 mg/L for lead; 0.806 mg/L for copper. This information can also be found in the 2022 Consumer Confidence Report on the Borough's website, showing that the treatment technique we are using for corrosion control is working well. The next time we test for lead and copper will be this year between August 1 and September 30.

So, when an employee from the water department drops off a bottle and asks for your assistance in filling it with a sample of your drinking water, you are helping us monitor for contaminates so your drinking water is safe. Thank you!

Water Distribution / Wastewater Collection

Well, the days are growing shorter and the morning air is cooler. Leaves will soon be changing color and starting to drop; so, it must mean fall is nigh. With the temps dropping, it's the perfect time to address any issues that popped up last winter that you didn't have time to finish before the summer heat



kicked in (i.e. drafty basements that can cause frozen pipes). Taking care of those issues now will make winter a little more bearable.

In my department, fall brings with it one semiannual and one annual maintenance project each year.

Every spring and fall, we clean our water distribution system and check our fire hydrants. This is mandated by DEP! Our water system has grown over the years, so what used to take two evenings now takes three eight-hour workdays to complete. This flushing serves two functions – it cleans out the water main lines and moves fresh-treated water around the system.

Each year in October, we subcontract with Dukes to apply an EPA-approved herbicide to our sewer collection system in areas that are lined with mature trees. This process kills the tree roots that enter our 1950 sewer collection system thru cracks and defective joints, preventing major sewer blockages.

What's nice about this procedure is it really works! We have many years of data proving this. They guarantee it and that it will not kill the trees or shrubs that line our streets.

Because we live in a very old town that has many beautiful mature trees, this has always been an issue. What we did was to identify the trouble areas that had re-occurring blockages and divided them into four years of treatment. This also spreads the cost out over the four years and maintains Duke's guarantee. The end result? No more sewer blockages in these areas and beautiful trees in our community.

Be assured that both of these tasks are vital to the Borough, providing you with trouble-free utilities.

Note: Due to several water main breaks in recent years, the Water Department will replace 600 feet of 8-inch diameter main line pipe on Spring Street. As always, please find an alternate route as the road will be closed to all traffic. Work is expected to begin in the August time frame. Remember – temporary inconvenience for permanent improvements.

Highway Department

Yard waste will be collected curbside every second Friday of each month and every Friday in the month of November.

The compost area at the south end of St. Charles St. is available at other times for disposal of yard waste only.

Recently we have had significant damage done to the tub grinder from material that should not have been dumped in the compost pile, resulting in a temporary shutdown of the facility and caused a very large expense for the Borough.

The compost area is a privilege for our residents. Don't be the one that ruins this for everyone!

Several streets will be paved this year, including Long View Drive, Schuylkill Street, Market Street from St. John to St. Peter, Wilson Street from Pleasant Row to Margaretta Street, Union Street from St. John to St. Peter, Parkway from Dewey Street to West Liberty, and part of Caldwell Street. Use caution and look for de-

tours when approaching these areas. To report a pothole or blocked storm drain, please contact the Borough Office at 570-385-2841.

The remainder of the street sweeper schedule is as follows – August 4 – 8, September 2 – 5, October 7 – 10, and November 4 – 7.

Wastewater Treatment Plant

What a pleasant summer 2025 has brought us so far. It has been filled with gorgeous weather and plenty of rain to keep crops growing strong. During this past winter, our Tumbling Run reservoir experienced one of the lowest levels in recent memory. Our rains fixed that quickly.

However, down here at the wastewater plant, we tend to sit on edge during rainstorms. When it rains, our incoming flow skyrockets. What causes this you may wonder? It's called "I & I"... or inflow and infiltration.

Inflow is when stormwater directly enters the sewage collection system. On the residential side, this is caused from gutters and sump pumps being illegally tied into a sewer drain. This is not allowed per Borough ordinances. On the Municipal side, water can get in through manhole lids.

Infiltration is when groundwater enters through broken pipes throughout the system. Our system is very old, so it can be assumed there are many opportunities for groundwater to sneak in.

Once the flow spikes, we must take action. We monitor the plant to make sure all the pumps are running as they should at such high speeds; we watch how high the water level gets in our tanks; and, we also have to watch the Schuylkill River to make sure it does not flood into us.

These times can be stressful. It's a big responsibility to keep this operation running 24/7. Over the past 10 years the Borough has taken many steps to ensure that flooding is kept to a minimum. We have installed larger pumps, installed a force main to the river, and created a flood plain behind the compost area. The flood of 2006 was the main driving force behind much of this.

If you have any questions regarding whether your home is in compliance with gutter or sump pump flow, please reach out to the Borough Office and we can assist you with correcting this. In most cases, many homeowners are not even aware of where these flows go. Enjoy the rest of your summer!

Electric Department news

On-demand electricity may be as close as your nearest outlet or light switch; but, the journey it takes to get there is far from short and simple. The following is a look at the fundamentals of how power travels from a power plant to your house.

1. The first step in electrical power starts with producing or generating energy in the form of electric current. This almost always comes from a power plant with a spinning electrical generator.

- 2. The power heads to a substation at the plant, where it is converted into a very high voltage so it can travel long distances on the transmission grid.
- 3. The transmission grid is comprised of wires carried on large towers that move the electrical power between the power plant and local substations.
- 4. At the local substation, the voltage is lowered using a transformer and carried to homes or businesses over distribution lines. These lines are wires typically supported by wood poles or buried underground along roadways.
- 5. The power headed to your house will need to be stepped down to a lower voltage again. This is done using pole-mounted transformers (power poles with a gray transformer drum attached) and padmounted transformers (usually green steel boxes on the ground).
- 6. Power from the transformers travels via an overhead or underground line to the meter on your house.
- 7. The meter is connected to the circuit breaker panel, containing fuses and breakers that keep wires from overheating and becoming dangerous.
- 8. The circuit breaker panel then connects the power to the outlets and switches in your home, bringing electricity into your daily routine to help provide comfort, convenience, security, entertainment and much more.
