


WELCOME WARM WEATHER & NEW FACES




DOWNLOAD SAVVY CITIZEN

 - For minors ages 16 & 17: Curfew is from 11:00 PM until 6:00 AM

WHY DO WE SWEEP OUR STREETS?



You may be familiar with the process of moving your vehicle to avoid a parking ticket for the street sweeper, but many are not aware why this machine operates. Street sweeping not only makes the streets cleaner, it is an important part of storm water pollution prevention. It prevents unwanted materials from flowing into the storm drains, polluting our bays, and causing backups & flooding. It also keeps job sites clean and safe, and minimizes tire damage to vehicles.

Here are some of the ways the street sweeper helps our community:

Improves Safety

Drivers must utilize roads to make their ways to work, school and other pressing activities. They will be better off if they are not constantly worried about their safety on the road.

By leaving stray trash on our streets, drivers are susceptible to skidding, sliding, and colliding with other automobiles. A small tire skid can lead to a much larger accident in just seconds.

WHY DO WE SWEEP OUR STREETS?

Helps the Environment

Dirty streets can negatively affect the environment in numerous ways. After waste particles make their way onto roadways, they can then be carried along into the ecosystems of various animals. These contaminants can poison the ecosystems of these animals, turning their habitats into toxic wastelands.

There is also the possibility that road litter could attract animals, bringing them closer to roadways, thus increasing the chances of animal-involved car accidents. By keeping our streets swept and protecting your surrounding environment, we are also protecting our residents and visitors who use our roads.

Protects Vehicles

Perhaps the most important reason to have streets swept regularly is to protect the overall quality of automobiles which use our streets.

When stones, trash and other debris are left on our streets, they create a major nuisance to automobiles. Not only can rocks kick up and puncture vehicles, large debris can cause drivers to swerve violently, resulting in serious car accidents. Allowing more debris to build up on our roads only makes matters worse.

Protects Pets

You may not realize it, but having a street sweeper in your neighborhood keeps your pets safe. This is because animals, including house-pets, gravitate to the scent of rotting food and debris in your gutters. Unfortunately, the debris that gathers in your gutters can contain sharp objects, toxic chemicals, or hazardous materials.

Summer Tips

PROTECT OUR WATERSHED!

Measure

Use fertilizers, herbicides, and other chemicals cautiously and only as directed.

Dispose

Dispose of your household hazardous waste (HHW) properly at local disposal events.

Wash

Wash cars at commercial car washes where there are sanitary sewers and the water is treated, unlike kneeds residential sewers.

Replace

Replace grass seed with wildflowers, clover, moss, or other native plants to prevent runoff, naturally.

Scoop

Pick up your pet's waste to ensure no pollutants get washed into the storm drains.

Conserve

Only water lawns when necessary. Lawns need only about 1" of water a week, so be sure to take advantage of the rain.

Basic Tips



CLEAN SURFACES, **UTENSILS AND** HANDS WITH SOAP AND WATER. If you're at a picnic, bring moist towelettes to use!



Wash all produce water before eating even if you plan to peel them!

SEPARATE PLATES AND UTENSILS. When grilling, use separate plates and utensils for raw and cooked meat and poultry and ready-to-eat foods (like raw vegetables).



USE A FOOD THERMOMETER.

Burgers:



burger is brown, not pink, doesn't mean it's safe to eat!





CHILL RAW AND PREPARED FOODS PROMPTLY if not consuming after cooking.



Don't leave food at room temperature for longer than two hours (or 1 hour if it's above 90°F). If planning a picnic perishable food should be kept in an insulated cooler packed with ice or ice packs.

Chicken and Turkey: 165°F.



Rinse all produce before peeling or chopping



Chop all produce with clean knives on cutting boards not used with raw meat to avoid cross-contamination.

Learn About the Mental Health Co-Responder Program

The Steelton Borough Police Department is proud to announce that we now have a mental health co-responder on our team. This model of criminal justice diversion pairs law enforcement and behavioral health specialists to intervene and respond to behavioral health-related calls for police service. These teams utilize the combined expertise of the officer and the behavioral health specialist to de-escalate situations and help link individuals with behavioral health issues to appropriate services.

Jordan Rolko (pictured right) joined the Steelton Police Department in March 2022 and has made a direct impact within the community. Jordan responds to calls involving mental health issues and provides resources and treatment services that police may not be as familiar with. The goal is to reduce serious mental illness within the criminal justice system and provide alternatives to arrest and incarceration.







Minute with the Mayor



Hey Family! I'm so excited to be able to reach you again through our newsletter, as I know this is one of the effective methods of communication to our community. I have been busy serving you, the people, and keeping our community safe. Public Safety and the Police Department is where a Borough Mayor has power and responsibility to the residents, so I have been working with our police force and public safety committee to make sure we are doing everything feasible to decrease crime and put policies in place that will give us the best tools needed to serve well.

One of the initiatives that I'd like to expound on is the newly enacted Property Nuisance Ordinance. This piece of legislation was approved and enacted this past February by Borough Council. This was a collaborative effort between Council, our Codes Department, and Police Department. This ordinance gives us the ability to combat with chronic property nuisances. These nuisances can include loud

chronic noise, various crimes, drug activity, and much more. I encourage all residents to read the ordinance in its totality to better understand how we are addressing these issues.

Last summer we saw an uptick in property theft and car break-ins. Sadly, many that have been caught on video are juveniles. In an effort to be proactive this upcoming summer, we will be heavily enforcing curfew for juveniles. Minors ages 15 & under must be off the streets by 10:00 PM and minors ages 16 & 17 must be off the streets by 11:00 PM. This will give law enforcement the ability to patrol more areas, respond to emergent calls in a timely fashion, and hopefully decrease the amount of crimes we have seen in the community.

On a lighter note, we are always finding more ways to engage with residents, whether it's connecting with residents over watering crops in the Community Garden, holding conversations at Turkey Hill mid-coffee sips, or giving the youth rides to school and practice. We are here for the community and want to serve the best way we can.

There have been many changes in the Borough, including a new Borough Manager, new Council leadership and new faces on the police force. My hope is that as these individuals find their footing in their new roles so that we can collectively come together to envision a new and improved Steelton. One where the community is our utmost priority, safety is always improving, and businesses have the support they need to keep their doors open. It will take time and work, but do know that I am always fighting and advocating for you! Remember, I'm only a call or email away. I'd love to hear from you! Enjoy the beautiful days ahead of us!
