



IMPORTANT NOTICE FOR MUNICIPAL VOTERS

Florida law requires voters to be registered only at their legal residence, not a business location. Your residential address - the place you consider your permanent home - determines whether you are eligible to vote in municipal (city) elections.

Who can vote in city elections?

- Individuals who live within the city limits and are registered Florida voters.
- Residency must be a person's legal domicile - their true, fixed, permanent home.

*Mixed-Use Properties - Only individuals who physically reside in the residential portion may register to vote using that address.

Who is not eligible?

- Business owners who do not reside in the city.
- People who live outside the city limits, even if they work in or frequently visit the city.
- Anyone attempting to register using an address where they do not actually live.

How we protect local elections?

- Our office verifies every new address using the Property Appraiser's land-use records.
- Our point-based address validation system blocks non-residential properties from being entered.
- We routinely review and update the voter rolls.
- Each voter must sign an oath at the time of voting. The oath affirms that the voter is the individual listed on the voter registration rolls, resides at the registered address, and understands that committing voter fraud is a third-degree felony.
