



Convenience Center Acceptable Materials

Construction Debris

Broken concrete, bricks, and other masonry materials can go into a roll-off dumpster. These materials are heavy but suitable for disposal.

Scrap wood, plywood, and lumber from construction or demolition projects are generally accepted in dumpsters. However, treated or painted wood might have restrictions.

Household Junk

Old furniture items like sofas, chairs, and tables can be placed in the dumpster.

You can dispose of household appliances, such as refrigerators, washing machines, and stoves. Ensure they're empty of any hazardous materials or refrigerants.

Yard Waste

Pruned tree branches, brush, and yard trimmings are typically allowed in roll-off dumpsters.

You can add leaves, grass clippings, and other organic yard waste to the dumpster.

Roofing Materials

Asphalt or wood shingles from roofing projects are acceptable materials for disposal.

Items such as tar paper and roofing nails can be placed in the dumpster alongside shingles.

Drywall and Insulation

Gypsum drywall or plasterboard from renovation or construction projects can go into the dumpster.



Fiberglass or foam insulation materials are typically accepted.

Metal Scrap

Any non-hazardous metal, including steel, aluminum, and copper, can be put in the dumpster. Recycling metal is an eco-friendly option.
