2024 SHADE TREE PLANTING

Crafton has been a Tree City USA for 35 years! A community must fulfill several requirements in order to retain this designation, one of which is a commitment to planting trees. That is because the tree canopy must consistently be replenished as older or unhealthy trees die off. Crafton does just that with its shade tree program.

The Borough used to plant new trees in residential "tree lawns", those narrow, curbside grassy strips. However, growing conditions there are very harsh, and trees are much more susceptible to damage and tend to have shorter lifespans. A few years ago, the Borough transitioned to planting in front yards for several reasons. In this larger growing space, trees tend to be healthier and live longer. As they mature, they provide privacy and shade for homeowners, enhance the streetscape, and provide much-needed shade for our sidewalks.

People get much more than a free tree! With the motto "choosing the right tree for the right place" and under the guidance of the Shade Tree Commission, homeowners get a free shade tree species appropriate for their yard. Public Works professionally plants 2" caliper ball and burlap trees, stakes and mulches them, and installs

deer protection. Tree care is up to the homeowner - a couple of summers of regular, supplemental watering, replenishing mulch (this is free from the Borough and is available in a bin





at Crafton Park), and keeping those deer guards on until the bark thickens up. If your house is sited on an embankment, don't worry. They will hand dig and plant a slightly smaller tree. Is your front yard quite small? We will do our best to find the right size tree for your yard.

This year, nine homeowners signed up to receive a front yard tree. On December 12th, our planting crew – the entire Public Works department – braved freezing temperatures and expertly planted beautiful specimens of oak, serviceberry, maple, yellowwood, and tulip trees. A huge shoutout and warm thanks to our great Public Works crew: Tyler Albert, Bill Finlay, Billy Francis, David Killen, Ray Murrman, Andrew Rutherford, and Matt Schaldenbrand. You couldn't ask for a finer planting job than what they provided for our community.

We are deeply grateful to Shade Tree Commission member Mary Luxbacher and former member Susan Mucha for the many hours they devoted to coordinating this year's planting.

Council President's Message

After an excellent 2024, the staff, council, and volunteers have been working hard on 2025 goals and projects. Since the last newsletter, we had quite a few accomplishments including:

- Garbage/Recycling Contract With the expiration of the Waste Management contract in December, Valley Waste began services in January after a thorough evaluation process including important community input. With a change in pickup days for some residents, service levels have been great with a slight price increase for the 5 year contract.
- 2. Stairs Projects All three sets of stairs were opened after extensive repairs utilizing grant funds obtained by State Rep, Dan Deasy.
- 3. 2024 Year End Financials Crafton finished the year with a small budget surplus (that will be transferred to our reserves) through continued fiscally responsible spending.
- 4. 2025 Budget Council approved the 2025 budget with community input in the December meeting. The new budget includes several infrastructure projects with grant and bond funding, in addition to no tax increase for the 5th year in a row!
- 5. Shade Tree Planting Maintaining our Tree City USA designation, 15 trees were planted in resident front yards in December. Crafton added 37 total new trees to our Borough in 2024!



Council President

We are working on the following projects:

- 1. Crafton Website A new website is in production with updated online forms, current events, and resources in an easy to find format. Look for a spring launch.
- 2. Trails Study With grant funding, 16 residents were selected (out of 30 applications) to focus on the Chartiers & Bakers Acres trail study, including feasibility for development of the trails and a roadmap for development.
- 3. Board/Commission Vacancies For 2025, we only have a few opportunities available with expiring terms. Check out the Crafton website to submit an application to get involved.
- 4. Ewing Road Closure The Infrastructure Committee is meeting with our Engineers to review options for the unstable road.

Our future projects include:

- 1. Broadhead Sewer Separation Project This is a major project that will improve our sewer systems (as required by Alcosan consent decree) in addition to fixing the corresponding roads with \$7M in grants awarded. Work will begin this year.
- 2. C-20 Sewer Separation Alcosan accepted the major project, and the application for additional funding to meet the consent decree has been submitted.
- 3. Linden & Steuben Light Signals Funded by a GLG grant from PennDot (and a 20% match), work will begin this year to replace the traffic and walk signals. Supply chain issues with the poles have delayed the project to this Spring.

As a reminder, Council meetings are open to the public, and I encourage residents to attend (2nd and 4th Thursday of every month at 7:00 PM) in person or via Zoom to keep up to date on what is happening in our community. If you have questions about the agenda or items in the community, please feel free to reach out to me.

It was good seeing many of you at the Celebration of Lights, Holiday House Tour, Native Seed Sowing, and Valentine's Day Murder Mystery. The Recreation Board is planning activities for the year including several traditional favorites. I hope everyone is staying warm and looking forward to Spring right around the corner. I continue to appreciate the opportunity to serve you.

We are fortunate to have such dedicated individuals serving our town, and I am honored to be the Mayor of such an outstanding department.

Borough Engineer's Update

Hello Crafton Residents!

We are excited to share some fantastic updates that are making Crafton an even better place to live. Thanks to the hard work of our local government, Public Works team, and community input, we've made significant strides in improving infrastructure across the Borough. Here's a look at some of the recent and upcoming enhancements you'll notice around town:

New Stairs for Safety and Accessibility

We've installed brand new stairs in key areas to improve accessibility and safety for everyone. These upgrades ensure that residents, especially those with mobility challenges, can more easily navigate our hilly terrain. We appreciate your patience during construction and are thrilled with the results that are now ready for use!

The newly constructed stairs include:

- · Walnut to Crafton and Crafton to Clearview
- · Fountain to Promenade
- Belvidere to Afton (New handrails only)

Retaining Crafton's Historical Charm with Updated Street Signs

Crafton's streets are now easier to navigate with the installation of new, historic street signs throughout the community. These signs are not only more visible but also reflect the Borough's charm by retaining its new, appealing design. Whether you're a long-time resident or a new neighbor, these updates will make it simpler to get around town. Be on the lookout for Public Works to replace all the remaining, green-faced signs with new ones this year!

Sewer System Improvements

Our ongoing commitment to maintaining a strong infrastructure has led to several updates to Crafton's sewer system. In addition to ensuring compliance with ALCOSAN's consent order, the recent repairs and upgrades are aimed at preventing flooding and ensuring that our sewage system operates efficiently for years to come. These efforts help safeguard both the environment and the health of our community. A reminder that the following sewer projects are scheduled to take place this year:

- C-20 Sewer Separation Steuben St. and Linden Ave.
 Estimated construction to begin Spring 2025
- Broadhead Sewer Separation Belvidere St., Broadhead Ave., Crennel Ave., N. Emily St., N. Linwood Ave., Coulter St., Parke St., Warren St., and Crafton Blvd. – Estimated construction to begin Summer 2025

New Public Works Building

The Public Works Department has a new home! A new, modern facility has been scheduled to be completed this year and will be used to better serve the Borough's needs. This building will house essential equipment and provide

a central location for all Public Works operations, making it easier for crews to respond to maintenance needs and keep the Borough looking its best. Construction of the building began in 2022 with the exterior shell and half the concrete floor completed but unfortunately remained in that condition since then. The remaining build out design is close to being finished with final construction to start later this year.

Freshly Paved Roads for a Smoother Ride

If you've been out on the roads recently, you've probably noticed that several of our streets have received a fresh coat of asphalt. The newly paved roads ensure a smoother, safer ride for everyone in Crafton. Whether you're commuting to work or out for a walk, we hope you enjoy the improved drive and pedestrian experience. In addition to newly paved roads resulting from the upcoming sewer projects, Crafton is pleased to announce that the following roads and alley ways will be paved this Spring:

- · Home Avenue
- Sterrett Street (Areas from last summer's PA American Water work)
- · Rush Way (From Perrine Street to Sterrett Street)
- Newville Way
- Prince Alley
- Locust Street (End of 2025 by PA American Water)

Linden and Steuben Intersection Updates

In partnership with an awarded grant from PennDOT's Green-Light-Go program, the intersection of Steuben Street and Linden Avenue will be getting a major facelift this year. Some of the improvements include new traffic signals and mast arms, pedestrian signalization, pavement and crosswalk markings and ADA ramps. These improvements will increase the overall safety of the intersection for both motorists and pedestrians accessing the park, mini golf and the Crafton-Ingram shopping center.

Looking Ahead

These improvements are just the beginning of our ongoing efforts to make Crafton an even better place to live. The Borough Administration and our dedicated Public Works team are already planning for the next phase of updates, focusing on continued infrastructure improvements, trail development, and community beautification.

Thank you for your continued support and patience as we work to enhance our community. Together, we are building a brighter, safer, and more connected Crafton!

The Crafton Volunteer Fire Department 2024 Year in Review



As we enter our 135th Year serving the residents and businesses of the Boroughs of Crafton, Thornburg, and Rosslyn Farms

2024 was one of the busiest years on record for the Crafton Volunteer Fire Department. Made up of 100 percent volunteers, the Crafton VFD answered a total of 408 calls for service in 2024 ranging in everything from lift assists, EMS assists, lockouts, vehicle fires, motor vehicle crashes, power lines down, fire alarms, structure fires, and many other types of calls for service. We saw an increase of 53 more fire related responses in 2024 than we answered in 2023. In our first due area of Crafton,

Thornburg, and Rosslyn Farms, we had two building fires, ironically just six days apart in June. A rear balcony caught fire on a commercial property on Noble Ave and damage was minimal. The most serious first due fire was a room and contents fire in Rosslyn Farms just six days later, which was also brought under control quickly after arrival. Crafton also recently assisted Carnegie with a large commercial fire that was devastating to their business district in November when Riley's Pour House caught fire. 2025 appears to be picking up right where 2024 left off as we are already off to a busy start of keeping up with our average of slightly over a call answered per day.

In existence since 1890, the approx. 40 current volunteers of the fire department just don't respond to calls. We participate in all different kinds of training, meetings, and public service details including multiple touch a truck events, the Annual Easter Egg Hunt, the Halloween Safety Detail, and the favorite of most of our members, the Santa Claus Detail. These events have been a tradition of the fire department for many decades.

We are always looking for more members to join the ranks. Junior Membership starts at the age of 16 and no previous experience is required. We will train you, and provide all the necessary top of the line equipment to make your volunteer firefighter journey a successful one.

Our state-of-the-art building, in existence since 2001 boasts five full bays, a duty room, full kitchen, numerous offices, maintenance rooms, and a state-of-the-art gym with top-ofthe-line equipment that is available to use for the members. We train every Tuesday at 7:00 PM, so stop down to check us out or reach us on Facebook page.



Finally, we cannot thank the Crafton Community, including its residents, business owners, elected officials, community groups, our mutual aid companies, and the police department, for your continued support. We could not be ready to serve 365 days a year, 7 days a week, and 24 hours a day without you, and we wish everyone a safe and happy 2025!



Betsy Martin Tree Dedication - April 26

This past year, long time Crafton resident Betsy Martin died. Betsy had many important roles throughout her life including many that impacted the Crafton community. Betsy literally wrote the book on our community, The Story of Crafton 1740-1992, published during Crafton's centennial birthday, and she was very active in the Crafton Historical Society. Another service to our community involved her love of trees and green spaces. Betsy was an active member of Crafton's Park and Shade Tree Commission for many years. Many of the park and street trees you see today are there because of her tireless efforts to maintain and promote Crafton's prestigious status as a Tree City USA member. During our Tree City USA ceremony on April 26, we will be dedicating a newly planted oak tree in her honor and memory in Crafton Park. Community Garden Update

Crafton Community Farm is a communal garden in Crafton Park, located between the pavilions and the ball fields. The garden is run and maintained by volunteers, and we grow fruit, vegetables, herbs, and flowers all naturally, without chemicals. Each season, we harvest between 1000-1400 pounds of crops, and 95% of that fresh, delicious food is donated to the Crafton Ingram Food Pantry. There is a dedicated Children's Garden area, where young ones can grow whatever they want. Everyone can enjoy being in a peaceful, beautiful outdoor space, and can learn more about growing plants.

In 2024, we saved a lot of seeds from the plants we grew, and we will be sharing those with the community for free, through Crafton Public Library's Seed Library. Members of the community donated garden seating and trellises, and we received seeds, plants, and other materials through grants from Grow Pittsburgh's Allegheny Grows program, which helped us get the garden started in 2015.

We use the wonderful compost generously provided by Crafton Public Works, and Crafton Borough also allows us access to water for our drip irrigation system.



The 2025 season will start off with a planning meeting in March, some group workdays to prepare the beds and to plant spring and summer crops, and May 17 will be our 10th Anniversary Celebration Garden Party! Volunteers regularly work on the garden on weekend mornings, March through November, weather permitting.

We hope you and your family will come to experience the garden this year, whether it is to look around or to volunteer. No experience is necessary. We all learn from each other, and we have tools and gloves to share. If you are not into gardening, we also need help with social media, photography, and other skills.

Code Enforcement Update and Native Plants



Spring is a great time of year to clean-up our properties, and maybe get a jump on projects big and small. It's also a good time to prep gardens and work on landscaping projects. Working out in the yard and cutting grass can be time consuming. But what if it didn't have to be? What if there was a way to have your yard look nice with less work? Well, the answer is: you definitely can!

In Crafton, our ordinance on grass was amended to read as such:

302.4 Weeds. All premises and exterior property shall be maintained free from weeds or plant growth in excess of six inches and shall be landscaped so as to have either grass or other form of approved ground cover, growing or artificial or maintained in its natural state. All noxious weeds shall be prohibited. Weeds shall be defined as all grasses, annual plants and vegetation, other

than trees or shrubs; provided, however, this term shall not include cultivated flowers and gardens. Landscaping shall not include any plants documented on the Pennsylvania DCNR "Invasive Plants in Pennsylvania" list, including but not limited to bamboo plants. The planting of hardy indigenous species is encouraged.

Did you catch that last sentence? Indigenous plants are often also called native plants and are becoming the norm for landscaping because they require less resources and are less maintenance. There are multiple approaches to working them into your landscape plan but the main trend is to plant native trees and plants in beds and just keep grass for walking paths between the beds.


In Crafton, when one does this with indigenous plants they are within code. The areas need to have defined borders though so it's clear it's a garden. The benefits of landscaping this way are four-fold:

- Native plants are adapted to local conditions requiring less fertilizer and pesticides
- Native plants require less watering and help control storm runoff
- Native plants can help with air quality by reducing mowing and sequestering carbon
- Native plants provide food and shelter for native wildlife & support pollinators

You can even get your landscape habitat certified if you meet the criteria for certain organizations like Monarch Watch, Audubon, and the National Wildlife Federation.

As your code officer, I have been involved in native plant gardening for 16 years now and can identify most native plants and can confirm this is a fantastic way to lessen your burden and help the local ecosystems (many collapsing) all in one shot.




Garbage/Recycle Program

The new year brought changes to the residents of Crafton, via a new Garbage/ Recycle Hauler. We would like to thank you all for your support and cooperation during this transition. We all know change is not always easy but is often necessary. To help continue the ease of this transition, we would like to share these quick tips on continuing a successful first year with Valley Waste Services, Inc. Please make sure your trash receptacles are at the curb, lids securely on, by 6AM on your scheduled pickup day.



- Residents may put out one bulk item a week for pickup; however, you must notify Valley Waste at least one business day prior to your pickup.
- Residents should contact Valley Waste Services directly to report any missed pickups within 24-Hours at (724) 843-9373.
- Have more than five bags? You can purchase additional bag tags, \$10 for a strip of five tags, through Valley Waste Services and they will be mailed directly to your home.
- Recycling will be the key to keeping your solid waste to a minimum. There is no limit to the amount of recycling that can be placed out at the curb on recycle week. Recycle stickers are available in the Borough Building.




2025-2026 Collection Calendar

PENNSYLVANIA STATE SENATE

LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES IN 2025

State Senator Wayne Fontana, 42nd Senatorial District

During the 2023-34 legislative session, Governor Shapiro signed 217 bills into law, not including budget appropriations bills. The State House of Representatives passed 41% of the bills it received from the Senate whereas the State Senate only passed 28% of the bills it received from the House. Comparing these numbers to previous years, only the 1999-00 and 2007-08 legislative sessions were less productive. This can be attributed in part to the divided balance of power with the Democrats holding the majority in the House, along with the governor's office and the Republicans holding the majority in the Senate.

It is no secret that the Commonwealth is what is referred to as a "swing state" which is a state that has historically swung between voting for different political parties for statewide offices or the presidency depending on the election. The results of elections over the past decade-plus illustrate that point.

With legislative sessions in Pennsylvania being two years, the start of the 2025-26 session represents a fresh start for the General Assembly. I am hopeful that going forward the legislature can work together in a bipartisan manner so we can pass more meaningful legislation that will improve the lives of the people we serve.

To that end, I have introduced several pieces of legislation this session that I will work to advance through the legislative process. Some are bills that I offered in previous sessions while others are new. These priorities include:

- · Enacting Extreme Risk Protection Orders (Red Flag Laws), which enables family members and law enforcement the ability to petition a court to temporarily suspend an individual's access to firearms if there is documented evidence that an individual is threatening harm to themselves or others.
- · Protecting Insurance Coverage for Individuals with Preexisting Conditions, which prohibits health insurance companies from using an individual's preexisting medical conditions to deny or exclude coverage under a health insurance policy. Also prohibiting health insurance policies in Pennsylvania from imposing either an annual or lifetime limit.
- Helping licensed nonprofits like volunteer fire companies, veterans' organizations and youth sports leagues raise money by allowing for mobile payments for small games of chance.
- Incentivizing the redevelopment of aging or deteriorating properties by expanding the Local Economic Revitalization Tax Assistance (LERTA) cap from 10 years to 20 years.
- Requiring the installation of carbon monoxide detectors in child care facilities, lodging establishments, college dorms, and schools.
- Uniform Property Assessments would require counties to conduct property reassessments on a uniform five-year cycle as well as enhance the enforcement power of the State Tax Equalization Board.
- Green and Purple Alerts would establish alert systems, similar to Amber Alerts, for at-risk veterans and individuals with a mental disability who go missing.
- Helping individuals affected by problem gambling by prohibiting the Gaming Industry from marketing to individuals on self-exclusion lists. A separate bill I've introduced would prohibit the use of credit cards for online gaming.
- · A Casino Smoking Ban Compromise would allow a casino to choose between going smoke-free or completely enclosing a smoking area of the casino and installing an adequate ventilation system to eliminate the permeation of smoke into the nonsmoking areas.


