
2025 Budget

The 2025 Budget was developed through a collaborative effort by Borough Staff and Borough Council. Budget preparation begins in June, with department staff and Borough Council submitting requests for planned or proposed capital projects. A draft budget is then compiled and presented to Borough Council in October. Over multiple meetings, the Council carefully reviews each fund and line item.

The Borough manages nine distinct funds: General, Refuse, Stormwater, Water, Sewer, Recreation, Capital Reserve, Highway Aid, and Community Center. These funds include over 300 line items, ensuring precise classification of all income and expenditures. Final budget approval typically occurs in December following the required public review period and advertisement, along with any associated resolutions or ordinances regarding taxes and fees.

For fiscal year 2025, the approved budget adopts a strategic approach to sustain and enhance essential services. The real estate millage rates remain unchanged at 2.30 mills for general services, 0.28 mills for fire services, and 0.20 mills for EMS services. As a result, the average assessed property in New Freedom Borough will pay a total of \$577 annually in municipal real estate taxes for 2025.

While several line items saw increases, notable changes include higher costs for contracted police services and



electricity. Water and sewer user fees remain stable; however, an adjustment of \$10 to the quarterly refuse and recycling fee was necessary due to increased tipping fees at the York County Resource Recovery Center (see page 10, York County Solid Waste Authority).

Capital Improvement Projects for 2025

Though capital improvements are limited, they have been strategically prioritized. Key projects include:

- Road improvements across the Borough.
- Water treatment enhancements at Well #1.
- Replacement of 1,200 linear feet of failing stormwater pipe and nine catch basins along Bailey Avenue (see page 10, End of Year Grant Awards).
- Upgrades to the SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) system for Water Distribution.
- Replacement of aging equipment, including a 2010 service vehicle, the 1987 John Deere Backhoe, and the 1994 Bandit Chipper paired with the construction of a public drop-off site for lawn and leaf waste using grant funding (see page 10, End of Year Grant Awards).
- Construction phase of aeration system improvements at the wastewater treatment facility.

County, School, & Municipal Taxes


In Pennsylvania, property taxes are determined by millage rates set by three governing entities: County, School District, and Municipality. For residents of New

Freedom Borough, taxes are distributed among York County, the Southern York County School District, and New Freedom Borough.


Based on the average assessed property value in New Freedom Borough of \$207,425, the table and chart below and to the right illustrate how property taxes are allocated among these three entities.

Among the 36 boroughs in York County, the chart to the left highlights five of the most populated and their corresponding millage rates. While such comparisons provide a general perspective, it is essential to recognize that evaluating municipalities based solely on millage rates does not paint the full picture.

The cost of municipal operations and the responsibilities each borough assumes are influenced by various factors. These include: 1) Miles of Road to Maintain: The length and

condition of roadways within a borough directly impact maintenance, repair, and snow removal costs. 2) Overall Acreage: Larger boroughs may face additional expenses related to managing public spaces, utilities, and infrastructure. 3) Total Population: Higher population levels often necessitate expanded services such as public safety, recreation, and waste management. 4) Scope of Local Services: The range and quality of services provided, such as police protection, stormwater management, parks, and community programs, also significantly affect operational costs.

Closing

Borough Staff, with the support of Borough Council, remains committed to securing external funding for capital projects wherever possible. Through diligent fiscal management, adherence to the Fund Balance Policy, and proactive grant pursuits, the Borough aims to continually improve services, facilities, and programs for the betterment of the New Freedom community.

Public Meetings

Borough Council

The New Freedom Borough Council meets the second Monday of each month beginning at 6:30PM, except October which will meet on the 3rd Monday. In addition, Budget Meetings will be held October 6 and November 3 also at 6:30PM.

Planning Commission

The New Freedom Borough Planning Commission is a five member Commission with four year terms. This Commission is an advisory body to Borough Council with authority granted by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Municipal Planning Code. The Commission is tasked with reviewing and providing a recommendation on all subdivision and land development plans, in addition to all requests for variances and special exceptions under the Borough's Zoning Ordinance. The Commission meets AS NEEDED the third Monday of each month beginning at 6:00PM, except for October which will meet the fourth Tuesday.

Zoning Hearing Board

The New Freedom Borough Zoning Hearing Board is a three member board with one alternate. This Quasi-Judicial body, whose authority is also granted by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Municipal Planning Code, reviews and considers for approval all requests for variances and special exceptions under the Borough's Zoning Ordinance. The Board meets **AS NEEDED** the fourth Monday of each month beginning at 6:00PM, except for May which will meet the fourth Tuesday.

Property Maintenance Appeals Board

The New Freedom Borough Property Maintenance Appeals Board is a three member board with two alternates. This body is tasked with reviewing cases when a property owner challenges a code compliance notice of violation. Authority is granted by Borough Council through adoption of the 2018 International Property Maintenance Code. The Board meets only **AS NEEDED**.

Southern York County Regional Recreation Commission

The Southern York County Regional Recreation Commission is an eight member Commission appointed by New Freedom Borough Council and Shrewsbury Township. The Commission is tasked with providing the framework and mechanism to adequately maintain community recreation and parks services and facilities, and to organize, manage, sponsor, and supervise community events within the political boundaries of the Participants. The Commission meets the second Tuesday of each month beginning at 6:00PM. Meetings alter location monthly between New Freedom Borough and Shrewsbury Township.

Southern Regional Police Commission

The Southern Regional Police Commission is currently a six member Commission appointed by the Borough's of New Freedom, Shrewsbury, and Stewartstown. The Commission is tasked with providing professional police services to the communities and citizens of the members. The Commission meets the first Wednesday of each month beginning at 7:00PM.


End of Year Grant Awards

New Freedom Borough closed out 2024 on a high note after receiving two significant grant award notifications.

The first award was granted by the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection under the Section 902 Recycling Grant Program. The \$138,330 grant will fund the purchase of a new chipper, a backhoe, and the installation of a recycling drop-off area for lawn and leaf waste, contributing to a total project cost of \$153,700. These additions will enhance the Borough's recycling capabilities and provide residents with year-round opportunities for proper disposal of yard waste.

The second award, a long-anticipated milestone, marked a major achievement for the Borough. In late December, New Freedom received the final award notification from the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program. This \$313,165 grant will finance stormwater infrastructure improvements along Bailey Avenue. The project will include the installation of 1,200 linear feet of piping and nine catch basins, addressing critical drainage issues and mitigating future stormwater impacts, for a total project cost of \$346,130.

With these two new awards, New Freedom Borough has secured over \$2.3 million in grants over the past four years. This accomplishment underscores the Borough's commitment to securing outside funding for important community projects whenever possible. The chart below illustrates the Borough's continued dedication to leveraging external resources for the benefit of its residents. These grant awards represent the Borough's proactive approach to improving infrastructure, enhancing services, and fostering sustainability, all while minimizing the financial burden on residents. New Freedom Borough remains committed to pursuing opportunities that benefit the community and ensure a brighter future for all.

Payment Options:

By Mail: Taxes may be paid by sending a check or money order payable to New Freedom Borough Tax Collector, along with the tax collector's portion of the bill. If a receipt is required, you must send a self-addressed, stamped envelope and the entire bill (do not detach the taxpayer's portion) along with your payment.

U.S. Postal Service postmark date will be used to determine whether a payment has been paid at Discount, Face or Penalty. NO EXCEPTIONS.

In Person: You may pay in person with cash, check, or money order during the dates and hours listed below. Payments cannot be accepted by the Borough Office or placed in the Borough's drop box.

Keep Your Sidewalks Safe This Winter

Snow Removal Reminder for Residents

With winter upon us, it's important for all residents to be aware of their responsibilities regarding snow and ice removal. Ensuring that sidewalks are clear and accessible not only keeps our community safe but also promotes a sense of shared responsibility among neighbors. The following guidelines from the Borough Code of Ordinances outline what is required of residents to maintain safe walkways during the winter season.

33 Timeframe:

To keep sidewalks safe for pedestrians, snow and ice must be cleared within 24 hours after the precipitation stops.

Who Is Responsible?

The responsibility for sidewalk clearance depends on property status:

- The property owner is responsible if the property is owner-occupied or unoccupied.
- The tenant or occupant must handle the removal if they are the sole occupiers of the property.
- The property owner is accountable for multi-business or multi-dwelling properties, as well as properties with an unoccupied first floor.

Real Clearance Width:

To ensure safe passage for all, sidewalks must be cleared to a minimum width of 36 inches.

Snow Disposal Guidelines

Proper snow disposal is equally important in keeping our community safe and functional. Please remember the following:

- Do not deposit snow or ice on or next to fire hydrants.
- Avoid placing snow on roadways or sidewalks.

Borough Enforcement

To maintain community safety, the Borough reserves the right to step in if property owners, tenants, or occupants fail to comply with these requirements. If sidewalks are not cleared within the specified timeframe, the Borough may clear them and recover the costs from the responsible party. This expense is in addition to any fines or penalties that may apply.

Section 2 Violations and Penalties

Non-compliance with these regulations can result in fines ranging from \$50 to \$600. In cases where fines are not paid, imprisonment for up to 30 days may apply. Additionally, each day of continued non-compliance counts as a separate offense, which can result in cumulative penalties.

Why Compliance Matters

Clear sidewalks are essential for the safety of all residents, particularly children, the elderly, and those with mobility challenges. By promptly clearing snow and ice, you contribute to a safer, more accessible community. Additionally, adhering to these regulations helps avoid penalties and fosters goodwill among neighbors. Winter weather can be unpredictable, but our commitment to keeping sidewalks safe and passable shouldn't be. Let's work together to make this winter season a safe and enjoyable one for everyone in New Freedom Borough.

York County Solid Waste Authority

The tip fee for York County processible municipal solid waste at the York County Resource Recovery Center (YCRRC) for 2025 will increase in response to fiscal pressures created by rising operational costs, current and future environmental control upgrades at the YCRRC, and the York County Solid Waste Authority's (YCSWA's) obligation to prepare for the future and ensure York County's waste is properly managed with sustained environmental protection. With uncertainty over future local landfill capacity, YCSWA must prepare now to meet the future waste management needs for York County.

Tipping fee revenues help to fund operations of the York County Resource Recovery Center, operations and maintenance of the York County Sanitary Landfill/Hopewell Area Recreation Complex, electronics recycling, household hazardous waste collection, secure drug take-back programs, public education and community outreach efforts, and other programs aimed at waste reduction and recycling.

YCSWA facilitates responsible solid waste management through an integrated strategy that emphasizes waste reduction, reuse, recycling, and resource recovery.

Extra Refuse Bags Now Available

New Freedom Borough has partnered with Penn Waste to provide residents with the option to purchase additional refuse bags for those occasional instances when trash exceeds the capacity of the designated toter. These 35-gallon refuse bags are available for purchase at the Borough Office during regular business hours (Monday-Friday from 7:30am to 4:00pm) for \$5 each. Once purchased, these bags can be placed curbside alongside the designated toter on your scheduled collection day. This convenient option ensures residents can manage extra waste efficiently and in compliance with collection guidelines.
