

Sue Vertosick 1218 Union Avenue








Becky Stillwell 1206 Florida Ave

When we first moved in, we were delighted with surprise flowers we hadn't seen before. A favorite is the "Kansas" poppies. Seeds were from Kansas which is where Sarah Pulaski grew up. We shared some of the seeds with one of her children so they could grow them in the assisted living facility where she lived. The old apple tree has seen better days, but I love the gnarlly trunk and it still produces fruit. A few years ago we were gifted small banana tree "pups". These grow like crazy....leaves almost 20' high. Each year we add a few new plantings. John's a retired mail carrier and in the summer the yard is almost a full time job. Still weeding.....
