## Borough Day, Pumpkin Patch, Halloween & More!

Summer fun in Schuylkill Haven has been enjoyable and plentiful, spectacular fireworks in July, and the recent Island Park Festival in August. That fun continues well into fall with Borough Day, Fall Fest and Pumpkin Patch, the Haven Halloween parade and, of course, Trick-or-Treat.

Details on these events can be found in this issue of *Haven Highlights*; but first, we start with Borough Day. Now celebrating its 38th year, the area's largest street faire comes alive again on Saturday, Sept. 26.

Early risers are welcome to start the day with a Fire House Breakfast, beginning at 7 a.m., at the Schuylkill Hose Company #2, 51 S. St. Peter Street. Catch the R & J's Big Yellow Shuttle downtown as vendors will line the streets with crafts, jewelry, baked goods, clothing, artwork and food starting at 9 a.m.

Just some of the food options include pork BBQ, fresh cut fries, steak sandwiches, ribs, Philadelphia soft pretzels, lemonade, ice cream, and funnel cake.

In support of the local churches, many will be offering a great selection of hot food, baked goods, and items for sale. Sounds of blues, country, rock, Celtic and folk performers will entertain at every turn from multiple stages located throughout the downtown area.

## Parkway Playground

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# Hillside SPCA Needs A Financial “Rescue” of Its Own

## Action Needed Now to Build a New “Big Dog House”

Serving an area more than 780 square miles, Hillside SPCA is a vital lifeline for animals in need. It has saved and changed the lives of an estimated 44,731 cats and kittens, 20,746 dogs and puppies, and over 2,132 other animals since 1986.

Hillside is a no-kill shelter. Animals stay as long as needed until they find a loving home. Each resident is given a name, quality food, cozy blankets, and the chance to thrive. It takes hundreds of thousands of dollars each year to keep Hillside’s doors open, but its mission remains unwavering: the physical and emotional well-being of the animals. Funded almost entirely by donations, every dollar is spent for the benefit of animals.

For four decades, the original Big Dog Building at Hillside SPCA has been a place of hope. It is where thousands of dogs (and originally cats, too) found safety after being abandoned, neglected, abused, injured, lost, or simply forgotten. It has been the place where frightened dogs learned to trust again and where forever families found their best friends.

Today, that building has reached the end of its life. It no longer can pass inspection and repairs are no longer possible. When that happens, they will no longer be able to house dogs.

Imagine Hillside not being there to rescue a dog tied to a tree in the woods, a puppy that was hit by a car, a senior dog whose owner passed away, or a litter of unwanted puppies.

For that reason, Hillside SPCA is asking all of us to support their current “Capital Campaign.” Its goal is to demolish the Big Dog Building and replace it with a safe, modern facility that will serve homeless dogs for decades to come... a building designed to meet their needs, protect the animals and staff, and ensure Hillside can continue answering the call when animals need them the most.

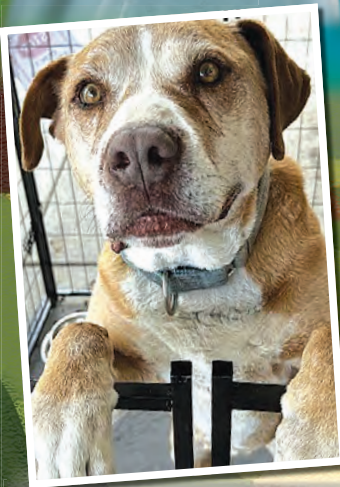
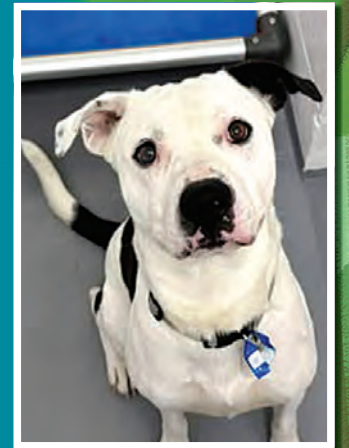

## Country Christmas Concert

The country-style Christmas concert features a variety of professional musicians and vocalists that have joined together over the past several years to bring this concert to the community. In its first year, the attendance - a one-night performance - drew 350 people. Last year the attendance was nearly 1,000 people over the two days and three performances.

Due to the growth of the audience and the overwhelming response, the concert venue is once again at the Pine Grove Theater, 213 South Tulpehocken St., in Pine Grove. Parking is available at School Yard Square, just one block from the theater. Shuttle ser-

vice to the front door of the theater is being provided by Newhurst Bus Company.

The inaugural Schuylkill Scarecrow Festival is a project of the Penn State Schuylkill's Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) Collegiate, in partnership with Penn State Schuylkill Art Space, South Schuylkill Unified and Schuylkill Connects.

With the theme "Create Something from Nothing," this family-friendly festival hopes to create an outdoor gallery of imaginative scarecrow displays using repurposed, reclaimed and recycled materials.

Registration opens in August; scarecrow construction and display takes place in September; judging and People's Choice voting will be held throughout October, with displays featured from October 1 through 31.

Registration costs are \$20 for businesses and \$10 for nonprofit organizations, residents and families. Prizes will be awarded in numerous categories.

Specific displays include collections acquired by the Historical Society of Col. James Schwenk and General Gary Sausser, with other memorabilia, such

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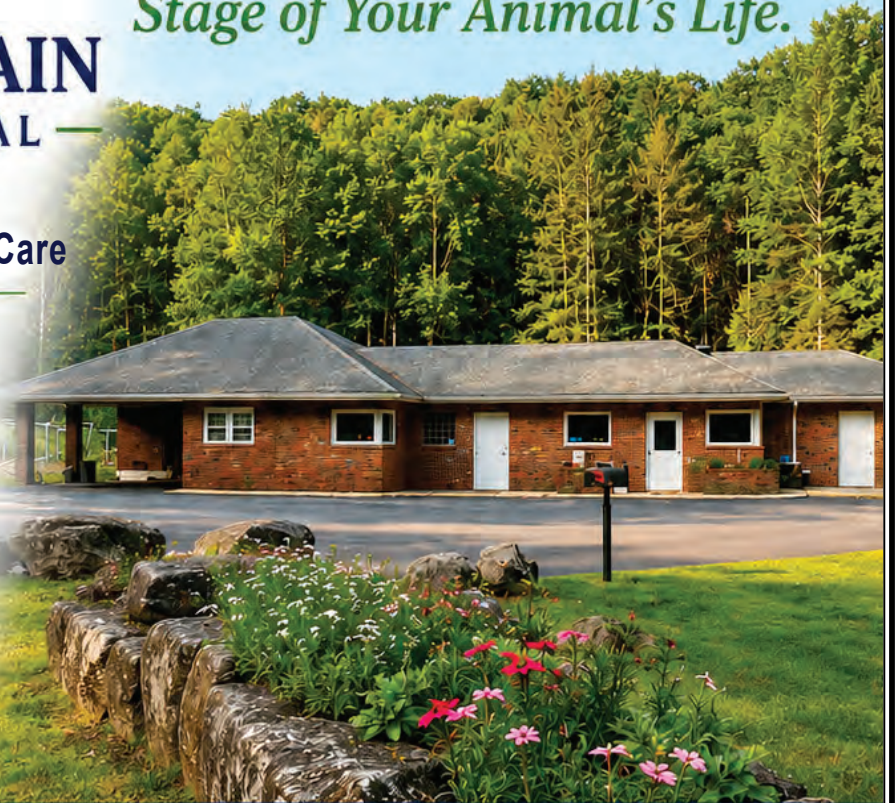

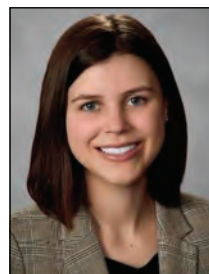

Recyclables may not come with any household trash/rubbish. Prior to pick-up, keep recyclables in the Anthracite Waste Services containers out of street view, if possible.

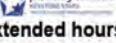

Schuylkill Haven Borough Tax Collector office hours for the remainder of the year are by appointment by calling 570-385-1313 (please leave a message) or 570-990-6821.

I check in at my office in the Recreation and Senior Center, 340 Haven Street, numerous times during the week for messages and mail. Those with questions or needing help can also call the Borough Office at 570-385-2841 and leave a message with the Borough Secretary. The tax office can also be reached by email at [taxcollector@schuylkillhaven.org](mailto:taxcollector@schuylkillhaven.org).

For last minute taxpayers, my office will be open the last few days of 2026 - Monday through Thursday, Dec. 28-31 - from noon to 2 p.m. for cash or money order payments only.

Borough property tax and per capita tax bills are in the penalty phase, now until the end of December. Any Real Estate or Per Capita bill not paid by then will be turned over to Tax Claim for collection and any additional service fees. Everyone's Per Capita tax amount is \$11 per bill during the penalty period.

Tax bills may be paid by check or money order only. Anyone paying a tax bill after Dec. 14 should pay by cash or money order so that payments can be properly credited by Dec. 31. Keep in mind your tax is not paid until the check clears the bank.

When paying a tax bill, include the proper amount on the check. If the check is incorrect for any reason, it will be returned to the taxpayer.

## Water Treatment Plant

UGGH! MY WATER TASTES LIKE CHLORINE! Well, we're sorry for that; but, it's beyond our control. As a treatment facility, we have regulations and procedures that require compliance.

These regulations are set by two governmental agencies - first you have the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in Washington D.C. and then we have the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) in Pennsylvania.

When the water enters the distribution system from our storage tanks at Willow Lake, there is a

minimum level of chlorine that must enter the system. Our system consists of approximately 50 miles of pipeline. Consumers at the beginning get hit harder than those at the end of the system. Requirements call for a minimum level at the end, known as a residual. This number tells us that our disinfection is working throughout the system and the residual is the little bit we have left over. In the past, this number was set at 0.02 mg/L; it now has been increased to 0.20mg/L.

We check for this minimum number once per week. Samples are checked for Total Coli Form Bacteria. There are seven DEP-designated collection sites in our system, mainly close to the ends of the system.

There are three basic mechanisms by which coliform bacteria can occur in treated drinking water. First is break-through from the treatment process, possibly from a high turbidity reading at the plant that would trigger an alarm for the operators.

Secondly, coliforms can regrow typically in the bio films in the distribution system. We try to control this with a chemical addition at the plant and through flushing the system two times during the year.

And, thirdly, organisms result from a recontamination of the treated water within the distribution pipeline system. This could come from events such as a water leak or water main break, thus triggering a "Boil Water Advisory." This is for your safety and is a

requirement. We also try to have enough chlorine in the system to control this type of contamination until the issue, if any, is corrected.

So, the next time you take a drink of your water and taste or smell some chlorine, don't complain. Feel safe, it's for your protection. Here's a quick fix... fill a pitcher and put it in the fridge overnight. The chlorine will dissipate on its own.

## Water Distribution / Wastewater Collection

Well, the days are growing shorter and the morning air is cooler. Leaves will soon be changing color and starting to drop; so, it must mean fall is nigh.

In my department, fall brings with it one semi-annual and one annual maintenance project each year.

Every spring and fall, we clean our water distribution system and check our fire hydrants. This flushing serves two functions - it cleans out the water main lines and moves fresh-treated water around the system.

Each year in October, we subcontract with Dukes to apply an EPA-approved herbicide to our sewer collection system in areas that are lined with mature trees. This process kills the tree roots that enter our aged 1950s sewer collection system thru cracks and defective joints, preventing major sewer blockages.

Because we live in a very old town that has many beautiful mature trees, this has always been an issue. What we did was to identify the trouble areas that had re-occurring blockages and divided them into four years of treatment.

This also spreads the cost out over the four years and maintains Duke's guarantee. The end result? No more sewer blockages in these areas and beautiful trees in our community. Be assured that both of these tasks are vital to the Borough, providing you with trouble-free utilities.

Note: The Borough Water Department will be replacing the water main line on Columbia Ave. (Cressona) due to several main breaks in recent years. As always, please find an alternate route as the road will be closed to all traffic. Work is expected to begin in the August timeframe. Remember, it is a temporary inconvenience for permanent improvements.

## Wastewater Treatment Plant

What a busy summer 2026 has been! Between vacations, family time, and enjoying the beautiful weather, it has been a great season. At the wastewater plant,

we've had plenty of adventures of our own.

Each summer, we schedule our annual tank cleanings. The process is fairly straightforward, but requires careful planning, strict safety measures, and an understanding that anyone entering the tank is probably going to be a little smelly by the end of the day.

The first step is planning. We need to make sure the weather will cooperate so we can drain, clean, inspect, and refill a tank before the next rainstorm. Before draining begins, we also remove as many solids from the bottom of the tank as possible.

Once the tank is empty, we begin washing it down using a 1-1/2 inch fire hose. This removes the remaining solids and inorganic material, which are flushed to the sump pit and removed from the tank. After the tank is clean and dry, we prepare for entry. Typically, two operators enter the tank while a third remains topside to oversee safety and pass down tools as needed. We enter using ladders and safety harnesses, and everyone wears the appropriate personal protective equipment throughout the process.

Inside the tank, we carefully inspect all of the mechanical equipment that was previously submerged. We remove any rags and inorganic material that could not be washed away with the fire hose... often filling several five-gallon buckets. Every component is examined for excessive wear, chain slack, cracks, failing parts, proper equipment alignment, and other signs of potential problems. Once one side of the tank has been inspected, we repeat the process on the other.

It's not the most glamorous job. It can be dirty, smelly, and sometimes even a little boring. However, these inspections are essential for preventing equipment failures and reducing the risk of unexpected tank outages. Taking the time to be proactive during the summer helps us avoid having to be reactive during the winter, when repairs are often more difficult and costly.

After the inspection is complete, we slowly refill the tank and return it to service. A typical tank cleaning is a five-day project: one day to drain and wash the tank, one or two days for inspections and maintenance, one day to refill, and the fifth day... well, that's usually spent trying to get the smell out of your hands. We've found that lemons and vinegar seem to work pretty well!

During the cleaning process, you may notice some additional odors around the plant. As sludge on the bottom of the tanks is disturbed, it can release unpleasant smells. We do our best to minimize these odors, but they're simply part of the job.

## Electric Department news

On-demand electricity may be as close as your nearest outlet or light switch; but, the journey it takes to get there is far from short and simple. The following is a look at the fundamentals of how power travels from a power plant to your house.

1. The first step in electrical power starts with producing or generating energy in the form of electric current. This almost always comes from a power

plant with a spinning electrical generator.

2. The power heads to a substation at the plant, where it is converted into a very high voltage so it can travel long distances on the transmission grid.

3. The transmission grid is comprised of wires carried on large towers that move the electrical power between the power plant and local substations.

4. At the local substation, the voltage is lowered using a transformer and carried to homes or businesses over distribution lines. These lines are wires typically supported by wood poles or buried underground along roadways.

5. The power headed to your house will need to be stepped down to a lower voltage again. This is done using pole-mounted transformers (power poles with a gray transformer drum attached) and pad-mounted transformers (usually green steel boxes on the ground).

6. Power from the transformers travels via an overhead or underground line to your house meter.

7. The meter is connected to the circuit breaker panel, containing fuses and breakers that keep wires from overheating and becoming dangerous.

8. The circuit breaker panel then connects the power to the outlets and switches in your home, bringing electricity into your daily routine to help provide comfort, convenience, security, entertainment and much more.

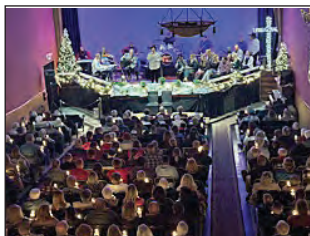
