FROM MAYOR RICK CREECY

As we move through another busy summer in Keiser, I would like to take a moment to update everyone on several important projects and improvements taking place throughout our community. Thanks to the support of our residents, city employees, volunteers, and grant partners, we continue to make steady progress in improving our infrastructure, public safety, and recreational opportunities.

One of the most anticipated projects is now underway in the Circle area of town. The Drainage Improvement Project has officially begun, and residents will begin seeing significant progress over the coming weeks. The project includes the replacement of culverts and other drainage improvements designed to improve water flow and reduce flooding concerns that have affected the area for many years. This investment will provide long-term benefits for residents and help protect homes, streets, and property during heavy rain events.

Our Fire Department recently received new equipment funded through the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation Grant. This grant provided valuable lifesaving equipment that will help our firefighters respond more effectively to emergencies while improving the safety of both first responders and the citizens they serve. We are grateful for the support of organizations that recognize the needs of rural communities and help us strengthen our emergency services.

I am also pleased to report that the Bike and Walking Trail at City Park has been completed. The trail has quickly become one of the most popular amenities in our community, providing a safe and enjoyable place for residents to walk, jog, bike, and spend time outdoors. To make the trail even more inviting, six new park benches have been installed around the walking trail, allowing visitors to rest, relax, and enjoy the park. We are also

installing a new barbecue grill at the pavilion to make the park even more attractive for family gatherings and community events.

Additional improvements are coming to the Senior Fitness Area as well. Two new pieces of exercise equipment are currently on order and will soon be added to the existing equipment. These additions will provide more opportunities for seniors and other residents to stay active and maintain a healthy lifestyle while enjoying the outdoors.

Another exciting development is the launch of the Keiser Senior Safety Program. This free program is designed for residents age 60 and older and focuses on wellness checks, fraud prevention education, emergency medical identification cards, and improved communication with first responders. Our goal is to help seniors remain safe, independent, and connected to the community. We encourage all eligible seniors to participate and take advantage of the services available through this program. In addition, we will soon be offering Disaster Preparedness Training for seniors to provide practical information on preparing for severe weather, power outages, and other emergencies.

We also continue making progress on our sewer system improvement efforts. Construction of the new Jefferson and Poplar Street Sewer Lift Stations remains on schedule for completion in August. These lift stations are critical components of our long-term plan to improve the reliability and efficiency of our wastewater system. We are also awaiting approval from the Arkansas Natural Resources Commission (ANRC) to accept bids for the citywide sewer rehabilitation project. Once approved, this project will move us one step closer to replacing aging sewer lines and addressing long-standing infrastructure challenges throughout the community.

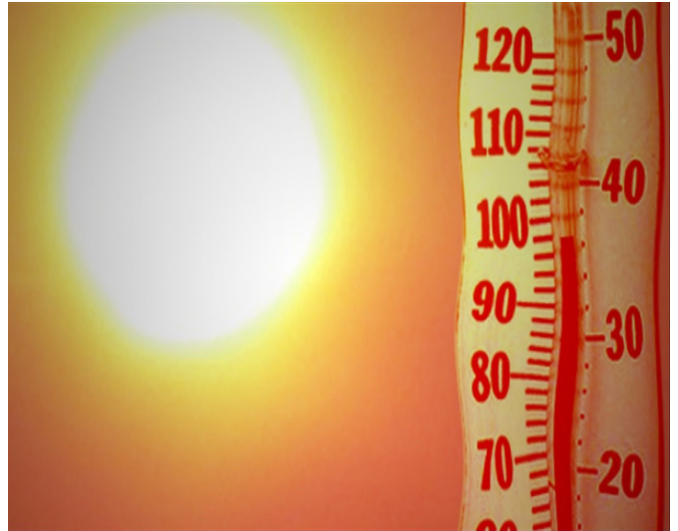

Summer is in full swing! The heat is upon us, so be sure to stay hydrated, as heat-related illnesses can be a deadly situation. We have had a few medical calls in the recent months involving our more senior citizens. We would like to remind the community of the Senior Focus program, offering assistance and helpful materials to our senior community members.

A couple thefts had been reported from storage units and some property has been recovered in an on-going investigation. Please remember to check on your units regularly to verify property remains untouched. The round "disc" shaped locks have shown to be the best in preventing theft from storage units. Also remember to keep a current, detailed inventory of property in your unit, with serial numbers if possible.

We have received assistance from the Arkansas Opioid Recovery Partnership to purchase a case

of Naloxone (Narcan) for use with the Police Department as well as assist in distributing to those who are uninsured or does not have coverage for the needed service, as well as training for the community. I thank you for the continued support of our agency.



City asks for Letters of Support

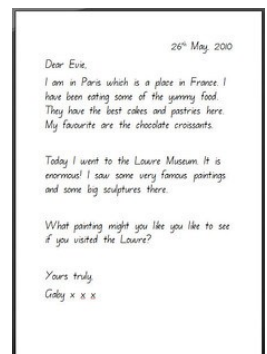
The City of Keiser is actively pursuing a grant through the Delta Regional Authority to continue making critical improvements to our sewer system, and we need your help to strengthen our application. Over the past several years, we have made meaningful progress in addressing the challenges of our aging infrastructure, but there is still more work to be done. Securing this additional funding will allow us to continue replacing deteriorated lines, improving system capacity, and reducing the ongoing issues that many of our residents have experienced.

One of the most important parts of this process is hearing directly from you—the people who live and deal with these issues every day. Grant reviewers want to understand not just the technical need, but the real-life impact these problems have on our community. If you have experienced sewer-related issues over the years, your story can make a powerful difference. Whether it is sewer backing up into your home, not being able to flush properly during heavy rains, manholes overflowing in your neighborhood, or dealing with slow drains and repeated problems, these are exactly the kinds of experiences that help demonstrate the urgency of our situation.

We are asking residents to take a few minutes to write a short letter in your own words describing what you have experienced. It does not have to be long or formal—just honest. Explain how these issues have affected your home, your family, or your day-to-day life. These personal accounts help paint a clear picture of why this funding is needed and why it matters so much to the people of Keiser.

Happening Around Town

As we continue working to move the City of Keiser forward, I would like to share several exciting updates that highlight the progress being made throughout our community. From seeking additional grant funding to improving our parks and strengthening public safety, we remain focused on making investments that will benefit our citizens today and for many years to come.

Earlier this month, I had the privilege of attending the Arkansas Municipal League's 92nd Annual Convention. This annual conference brings together city officials from across the state to discuss legislation, share ideas, receive professional training, and learn about new programs that can help improve local government. In addition to attending the educational sessions, I was honored to be invited to present during one of the convention's breakout sessions on the City of Keiser's grant-writing success. During the presentation, I shared the strategies we have used to secure millions of dollars in grant funding for our community, including the importance of long-term planning, building strong partnerships, involving our citizens, and never missing an opportunity to apply for available funding. It was rewarding to showcase what our small community has accomplished, and I hope our experiences will help other Arkansas cities bring additional resources back to their own hometowns. I am proud that Keiser continues to be recognized as a leader in pursuing grant opportunities that improve our community while reducing the burden on our local taxpayers.

Our City Park continues to see exciting improvements as we work to create one of the finest recreational facilities in our area. A new charcoal BBQ grill has recently been installed near the pavilion, providing another amenity for families, friends, and community groups to enjoy while spending time at the park. Whether you're celebrating a birthday, hosting a family reunion, or simply enjoying a weekend cookout, we hope this addition makes the park even more inviting. We have also installed bird netting throughout the pavilion to discourage birds from nesting in the rafters. This improvement will help keep the pavilion cleaner, reduce maintenance, and provide a more enjoyable experience for everyone who uses the facil-

ity for community gatherings and special events.

The Keiser Volunteer Fire Department continues to aggressively pursue grant opportunities to provide our firefighters with the safest equipment possible while protecting our taxpayers from unnecessary expenses. We recently submitted a grant application to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requesting funding to replace our firefighters' structural turnout gear. This specialized protective equipment is essential every time firefighters respond to structure fires, vehicle fires, rescue operations, and other emergency incidents. Much of our current gear is nearing the end of its recommended service life, and replacing it is one of our department's highest priorities. If awarded, this grant will provide new NFPA-compliant turnout gear that will better protect our volunteers from heat, flames, smoke, hazardous materials, and cancer-causing contaminants, while enhancing their ability to safely serve our community.

We have also submitted an application to the Arkansas Trails for Life Grant Program to complete the final remaining section of our walking trail at the City Park. Thanks to previous grant funding, we were able to replace approximately 2,100 feet of the original trail, but the final 400-foot section could not be completed because of funding limitations. This new application would allow us to finish the project by replacing the remaining deteriorated section, creating one continuous, safe, attractive, and ADA-accessible walking trail around the park. Completing this final phase will provide an even better recreational experience for walkers, runners, seniors, veterans, children, and families while encouraging healthy lifestyles and outdoor activity for citizens of all ages.

Every project we undertake reflects our commitment to making Keiser a better place to live, work, and raise a family. We will continue pursuing grant opportunities, investing in our infrastructure, improving our parks, strengthening public safety, and planning for the future—all while being responsible stewards of your tax dollars. Thank you for your continued support, encouragement, and involvement. Working together, we are building a stronger, safer, and more vibrant Keiser for future generations.

Keiser Senior Safety Program Kickoff Meeting

The City of Keiser is proud to introduce the **Keiser Senior Safety Program**, a new initiative designed to protect, support, and stay connected with the senior members of our community. Our seniors have helped build Keiser into what it is today, and this program is one more way we can give back by ensuring they feel safe, respected, and never alone. Through this effort, the City of Keiser and the Keiser Police Department are taking a proactive approach to improve safety, provide peace of mind, and strengthen relationships between our residents and local law enforcement.

To officially launch the program, we have scheduled an informational meeting on **Tuesday, July 14, at the Keiser First Baptist Church MAC Center. All seniors age 60 and older are encouraged to attend.** Family members and caregivers are also welcome. This meeting will provide an opportunity to learn about the program, ask questions, receive enrollment information, and learn about the resources available through the Keiser Senior Safety Program.

The Keiser Senior Safety Program is built around simple but meaningful services that make a real difference. One of the key components is regular wellness checks, which may be conducted either in person or by phone depending on the needs of each participant. These check-ins help ensure that seniors are doing well, have access to food, water, and utilities, and are not facing any immediate safety concerns. Just as importantly, these visits provide an opportunity for friendly conversation and connection, which can be especially valuable for those who may live alone or have limited daily interaction.

Another important part of the program is fraud prevention education. Unfortunately, scams targeting seniors continue to increase, and many of these schemes are becoming more sophisticated. Through this program, we will provide information on how to recognize common scams such as phone fraud, text message scams, and fraudulent requests for personal or financial information. By staying informed and aware, our seniors can better protect themselves and avoid becoming victims of these crimes. We will also share updates through community outreach, newsletters, and social media to keep residents informed about new threats.

The program also includes the distribution of Emergency Medical ID Cards, which can be a critical tool during an emergency. These cards allow first responders to quickly access important information such as medical conditions, medications, allergies, and emergency contact details. Having this information readily available can save valuable time and help ensure a faster, more effective response when seconds matter most. Participants are encouraged to keep their card with them at all times so it is available whenever

it is needed.

In addition, the program will utilize a secure Senior Safety Database to help improve emergency response and follow-up care. This system allows authorized personnel to maintain up-to-date contact information and notes from wellness checks, ensuring that concerns are tracked and addressed in a timely manner. By organizing this information, we can better identify needs, provide follow-up when necessary, and respond more effectively during emergencies.

Participation in the Keiser Senior Safety Program is completely free and voluntary. Seniors age 60 and older, as well as family members wishing to enroll a loved one, are encouraged to take advantage of this service. Whether someone simply wants occasional check-ins for peace of mind or more frequent contact for added support, the program is designed to be flexible and meet individual needs.

If you or a loved one would like to participate, please contact Keiser City Hall at **870-526-2300** or stop by during normal business hours to sign up. City staff and officers will be happy to assist with enrollment and answer any questions about the program.

July Through History

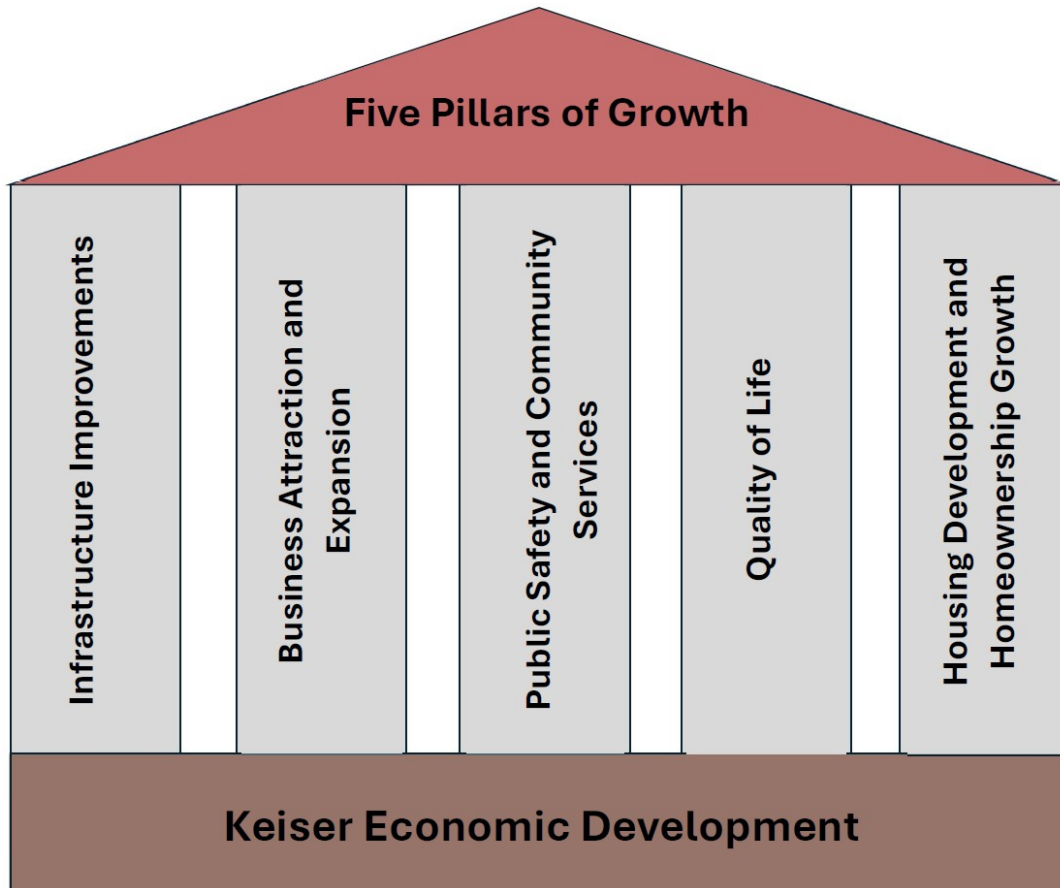

KVFD New Equipment

The Keiser Volunteer Fire Department recently enhanced its emergency response capabilities through the acquisition of new lifesaving equipment funded by a \$37,856.92 grant from the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation.

The grant provided the department with three Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) units, three backup air cylinders, a thermal imaging camera, and a four gas detection meter. This equipment will significantly improve firefighter safety and effectiveness during emergency operations.

The new SCBA units provide firefighters with clean breathing air while operating in smoke-filled and hazardous environments. The thermal imaging camera allows firefighters to locate victims, identify hidden fire hotspots, and navigate through low-visibility conditions more safely and efficiently. The CO gas detection meter helps identify dangerous levels of carbon monoxide and other hazardous gases, protecting both first responders and the public during emergency incidents.

The Keiser Volunteer Fire Department would like to express its sincere appreciation to the Firehouse Subs

Public Safety Foundation for its commitment to supporting first responders and helping rural communities obtain critical emergency equipment. This investment strengthens the department's ability to protect lives and property throughout Keiser and the surrounding area for years to come.

Through partnerships such as this, the City of Keiser and the Keiser Volunteer Fire Department continue to improve public safety while ensuring firefighters have the tools necessary to respond effectively when emergencies occur.
