Leveraging Technology to Improve Services in Forest Hills

In retrospect, 2024 brought of lot of changes to the Borough: three longterm employees retired, we brought in a new manager and public works foreman, and a number of long-term projects, such as the total renovation of the Westinghouse Lodge, were completed. Additionally, a lot of behind the scenes work has been going on to introduce technology. While they may not be glamorous, these new platforms can greatly increase internal efficiency, which means better service to you and potential cost savings in the future.

First, our asset management software will use technology to improve our tracking and completion of work orders in public works. This change, along with our GIS software, will allow us to track all our assets, from tools and computers to sewer lines and playground equipment. Aside from creating a database of our assets, this can help the Borough Manager and Treasurer create more accurate budgets and plan for upgrades and replacement of higher cost assets.

In October, a new Citizen Action Center went live, giving people the ability to pay their municipal bills online, including refuse and fire fees. It can also remember your card number (if you choose) and allow you to monitor your accounts, even if you choose not to pay through the Citizen Action Center portal. You will find a link to this on the Borough website under "<u>Electronic Bill Paying</u>."

Our new recreation software rolled out this summer. In addition to taking care of pool, tennis and other class registrations, it allows for online registration of the lodge rentals. Additionally, other tasks that require administrative labor will be handled online. We expect 2025 pool passes, classes and other activities to be even smoother.

Finally, one of the biggest changes is in front of you now. The Tree City Times is being published electronically only. This allows us to increase the number of issues published and make the newsletter a bimonthly product. With publication every other month, news will be timelier and will be of greater value to you, our readers and residents.

For those who do not wish to have it emailed, The Tree City Times will continue to be available on our website which will also be updated in the coming months.

Borough Receives DCNR Urban Forestry Community Grant *By Mark Haibach, Tree and Shrub Committee*

In November 2024, Forest Hills was awarded a \$160,500 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) Community Conservation Partnerships Program. The Borough applied for the grant this past April to fund two projects — a detailed inventory of all Borough street trees and significant trees in Borough Parks, and tree maintenance and planting at Main Park.

For the tree inventory, arborists will locate Borough trees using GPS and residential address; tag each tree with a unique identification number; identify the tree species; measure its diameter, height, and spread; and evaluate its health/ condition and priority for future maintenance (pruning, treatment, removal/ replacement). The Borough plans to house the information collected during the inventory in a map-accessible database that residents can view online and to use the information to prepare an urban forest management plan for Forest Hills.

The Borough hopes to select an arborist company to perform the inventory by the spring of this year and to complete the inventory, online map database and forest management plan by the end of the year. Keep a watch for further updates on the inventory in Tree City Times.

Tree maintenance and planting in Main Park will entail pruning and selective removal of trees that pose potential hazards to those using the park; removal of non-native, invasive trees and shrubs; and planting 85 native trees and shrubs to enhance the park. Our tree services company, Horhut Tree Experts, completed a tree hazard evaluation of all the Borough parks and developed a list of trees recommended for pruning or removal. You might have noticed these trees marked with either a large white dot indicating pruning or a white X indicating removal.

The Borough hopes to complete the tree maintenance work at Main Park in 2025 and to perform the tree planting in the fall of 2025 and spring 2026. The Tree and Shrub Committee is looking for volunteers to help us tend the newly planted trees and monitor their health. Interested in Volunteering as a Flivver Driver?

The Flivver is a bus service that was started in 1974 and recently celebrated 50 years of service to the Forest Hills Borough. All of the drivers gladly volunteer their time to serve this community.

The bus is a 12-passenger vehicle that takes senior citizens ages 55 and older and persons with special needs to grocery stores, the drug store, banks, doctors' offices, hairdressers and anywhere else within Forest Hills Borough. (The bus does not have handicapped lifts.) While the Flivver is a charity, contributions from riders are always welcome and help offset the cost of gas and maintenance.

The Flivver operates Monday through Friday from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Riders can call the Flivver at 412-519-3955 and be picked up usually within 15 minutes of their call. There are so many people in the borough who are grateful for the freedom the Flivver provides.

The Flivver is always looking for volunteer drivers. You do NOT need to have a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) and you can be trained to drive in a matter of hours. Those who are interested in driving a three-hour shift, twice a month, can call Don Newcomer at 412-708-0511.

WHEMS Annual Subscription Drive



Woodland Hills EMS will be sending out Subscription Drive information soon. Signing up for this program helps us help you. Your donation helps us with training, updated equipment and employee retention programs. As a member, you will not be charged for most treatment and no transport calls. If you are transported, WHEMS forgives 50% of what insurance does not pay.

Please sign up and talk to your neighbors about participating in this program. Currently we have less than 25% community participation in the four municipalities that use this program. Chalfant Borough does not participate in this program but instead has elected to have a 0.5 mill EMS tax added. Under the agreement with Chalfant, WHEMS does not charge its residents for **any** EMS service. It does not matter whether insurance or Medicare covers the transport. Chalfant residents do not have to worry about getting a bill when calling 911. How to Winterproof Your Home

Standard homeowner policies will cover winter-related disasters such as burst pipes, ice damming and wind damage, but consumers should keep their property well-maintained so that filing an insurance claim can be avoided altogether. Take steps now to protect your property from damage that could occur from freezing temperatures, snow and wind.

Outside your home:

- Clean out gutters by removing leaves, sticks and other debris so melting snow and ice can flow freely.

- Trim trees and remove dead branches, as the weight of ice and snow could cause branches to break and may damage your home, car or injure someone walking by your property.

- Seal cracks or holes on outside walls and foundations with caulk or weather stripping to prevent melting snow from seeping in.

Inside your home:

- Maintain a constant temperature in your home to keep your pipes from freezing.

- Adding extra insulation in your attic could prevent heat from escaping through your roof, causing snow to melt faster and overload your gutters.

- Check your pipes for cracks or leaks, and wrap any exposed pipes with insulation or heating tape.

- Make sure that smoke and fire alarms are working properly, and consider installing a carbon monoxide detector.

- Know where your pipes are located and learn how to shut the water off if your pipes freeze.


