Upcoming Grants for Small Businesses

York County is home to many organizations which make grants to small businesses, nonprofits, and local governments for a variety of purposes. The **Women's Business Center Organization** (WBCO), part of the York County Economic Alliance, is one of these.

WBCO's BLOOM grant program assists small businesses. To date, 235 York County small businesses together have received \$480,000 in total in BLOOM grants. (BLOOM doesn't stand for certain words, it's about helping businesses bloom and grow).

Each grant usually is dedicated to a specific group of businesses or individuals, such as women-owned businesses, or businesses serving York County. Learn more about WBCO at https://www.yceapa.org/events/wbco-athena/ and BLOOM at https://bloomyork.org/education/

WBCO's summer grant will focus on small businesses throughout York County. Details will be available on Monday, July 22, when the grant application period opens. This will include information on any specific purposes for the grant funds. In the past, for example, grants were awarded for projects to improve operations or expand services, new signage, façade improvements, new equipment, and much more. All applications will be due by August 12.

WBCO's winter grant will focus on women owned businesses. Details for this grant will be available on November 4, with all applications due by November 25.

Grants are almost free money. In return, the grantee must give progress reports to the grant maker and a final report on the success of the project. Some grants have a "match" requirement. That means in return for a \$5,000 grant, you might be required to put up 10% from your business, or \$500 in this example. That match is part of the budget for your own project, it is not paid to another person or organization. So if your grant is \$5,000, your budget is \$5,000 plus the 10% match for a total of \$5,500. Grants are not required to be paid back like a loan is.

Grants can sometimes be challenging to write. Free grant writing assistance is available from Wrightsville community volunteer Christine Siksa (christine.sixa@gmail.com).
