## From the Chairman's Desk...

Looking back on 2024, while keeping in mind goals I stated in my January 2024 "Meet the Supervisor" article, I am proud to say many of those goals have been accomplished thanks to the hard work and dedication of all involved at Cumberland Township. I have been honored to serve as Chairman of the Cumberland Township Supervisors in 2024. I look forward to improving on this role in 2025 thanks to the nomination of my fellow board members.

As chair of the finance committee, I am proud that another fiscally responsible budget has passed for 2025 without passing a tax increase on to my fellow Cumberland Township residents. This accomplishment is only because of the collective effort of the administration team, the police department, and the highway department being financially responsible over the past year and projecting the same for 2025. One especially important fiscal project that was completed in 2024 was the addition of Asset Allocation Tables for budgeting. These tables budget for large capital purchases for the next 20 plus years. This planning helps keep the township on financial track while also providing needed assets to the full-time staff of Cumberland Township in order to best serve our residents.

Another great accomplishment in 2024 was the building renovation project reaching the bid stage. Many, many hours of meetings, collaboration, and dedication have gone into getting to this milestone. This accomplishment is in large part due to the dedication of the Cumberland Township Manager Dave Blocher, our State Representatives, and the Cumberland Township staff. This team effort has also resulted in additional grants to the township to the tune of \$800,000 in 2024. Between these newest grants awarded those awarded in previous years, the township now has roughly \$2.1 million in grant funding. The \$2.1 million in grant funding will cover approximately half of the anticipated building cost. This renovation, projected to be completed by the end of 2025, will benefit Cumberland Township residents for generations to come!

One last accomplishment that I would like to highlight from 2024 is the continued support from the Cumberland Township Board of Supervisors to the Ag. Preservation line item in the 2025 budget. This line item has helped preserve the Maring Farm in 2024, a farm that lies within the boundaries of Cumberland Township. The preservation of the Maring Farm in 2024, the preservation of Dave and Bea Waybright Farm in 2023 and future properties will help keep Cumberland Township a desirable community that we all enjoy and live in.

Looking forward to 2025, many of my goals for 2024 still hold true for 2025. I look forward to providing the staff with the needed resources to continue to provide the high standard of services Cumberland Township residents value and have come to expect. These resources allow the staff to serve our residents while upholding the successful fiscal practices Cumberland Township has relied on for years. I also plan to continue to implement more ways to meet the needs of the Township from an urban, agrarian, and rural life perspective from years past. Building upon my continuous goals, I look forward to gaining more perspective and knowledge of residents' desire for recreation within the Cumberland Township boundaries and how that desire can come to realization in the future to add to the great Cumberland Township way of life.

## A Pile of Thank You's



## From your Maintenance Department...

Winter is an especially busy time for the Cumberland Township Maintenance Department. Not only are we prepared 24 hours a day 7 days a week in moment's notice to fight any winter weather Mother Nature throws at us, but the winter season is also a time that we perform maintenance on our equipment and prepare for projects for the upcoming season.

Crews will continue mapping the stormwater facilities throughout the Township using the GIS mapping system. These crews will be in an official Township vehicle and will have official Township identification. This mapping is being completed to comply with the Townships MS4 (Municipal Separate Storm Sewer) mapping which is required for state and federal compliances. Mapping is also used internally to track upgrades, age, and capacities of the collection systems.

There will be various street name sign upgrades around the Township in areas that projects were conducted this summer. These signs along with Speed Limit, Roadway Warning, and Directional signs will be utilizing a Hi-Viz material to help motorists identify the signs easily. Our crew also replaced and upgraded the Horse Crossing signs on Emmitsburg and Taneytown Roads to Hi-Viz materials to help protect those using the crossings.

Another big part of the winter season is tree trimming and removal of dead or hazardous trees. This task helps in various ways including improving sight distances and allowing sunlight to get to the roadways to help with thawing during winter weather.

As explained in the last issue of the Cumberland Township Dispatch, winter weather events can be hazardous to the traveling public. When winter weather strikes the Maintenance Department is out in full force striving to keep the roadways safe for the traveling public. Please use caution when approaching snow removal equipment. The Township uses Savvy Citizen, along with various local news media and public service outlets, to notify citizens and travelers of snow emergencies, closures, and delays.

This holiday season the Township will have a Christmas Tree Recycling Drop off at it's 1370 Fairfield Road location. Trees should be unwrapped, with no lights, ornaments, or bases attached. Please place the trees in the designated area in the orange fence adjacent to the administration building.


What's one thing you are looking forward to in the next year?

If you could have dinner with any historical figure or celebrity, who would it be and why?



## Let's Talk Storm Water!

### Winter Stormwater Tips

As winter approaches, it's crucial to ensure your property is ready to handle the challenges posed by snow, ice, and the potential for heavy rainfall. Effective stormwater management during the colder months is essential for preventing flooding, protecting infrastructure, and reducing the risk of water damage. Here are some winter stormwater maintenance tips to help you keep your property safe and your stormwater systems functioning properly throughout the season.

Inspect and clear gutters, downspouts, and drainage systems around your property. Accumulated leaves, debris, and ice can clog gutters, preventing proper drainage. Ensure French drains, swales, and catch basins are free-flowing and free of ice to prevent flooding.

While salt and de-icing agents are important for keeping sidewalks and driveways safe, they can have a negative impact on stormwater runoff. Excess salt can contaminate local waterways, harming vegetation and aquatic life. Use de-icing products sparingly, and consider using alternatives such as sand or non-toxic ice melts. Start shoveling early! The more snow you removed, the less salt or sand you will need. After storms, be sure to clear away any excess salt or de-icing materials from surfaces to prevent them from washing into stormwater drains. Remember - when the temp drops below 15 degrees, salt is not effective.

For properties with sump pumps, winter is a critical time to ensure they're in working order. Test your sump pump to confirm it's functioning properly and can handle the additional volume of water from snowmelt. Also, check if your backup systems, like a battery-operated backup pump, are in good condition in case of power outages during winter storms.



While it may be tempting to pile snow in convenient locations, avoid placing snow near storm drains, catch basins, or drainage systems. Snow piled on top of drainage infrastructure can block water flow and contribute to ice formation or flooding once the snow begins to melt. Ensure snow piles are placed in areas where they won't obstruct water runoff or drainage systems and have the most opportunity to infiltrate into the ground. Pile snow uphill from your rain garden so it can do what it is designed to do!





## Watershed Alliance of Adams County

### **Seedling Distribution Information**

This year the Watershed Alliance of Adams County continued its collaboration with the Adams County Conservation District as founding members of the Adams County Planting Partnership (ACPP). In 2024 the ACPP, through our spring and fall seedling distributions, gave away a total of 16,450 native trees and shrubs to over 640 participating residents. The seedlings are provided to ACPP by the Chesapeake Bay Foundation's Keystone Ten Million Trees initiative.

Since we began this partnership in 2018, we have distributed more than 87,000 seedlings, primarily to Adams County residents. This year we also conducted educational programs at both Gettysburg Area High School and the New Oxford Middle School. Students learned about watershed management as they planted seedlings along riparian buffers on their school property. We credit our many energetic volunteers—and the Conservation District's dedicated staff—for the ACPP's great success.

You might wonder, why is a watershed alliance so involved in giving away native plants? Native trees and shrubs are uniquely suited to our local ecosystems, and once planted by local landowners, they quickly and effectively set to work absorbing pollutants from stormwater runoff, reducing erosion, capturing atmospheric carbon, and in general going a long way toward helping us advance our mission of protecting and preserving Adams County's water resources.

We will be distributing seedlings to Adams County residents again during the spring and fall of 2025. This coming February watch for information regarding the spring seedling distribution on the Savvy Citizen app, the Watershed Alliance of Adams County website, or sign-up to be added to the seedling distribution reminder list. Join us as we help improve our watershed one tree at a time!

## Winter Lecture Series at Gettysburg National Military Park



Gettysburg, PA – Beginning January 4, 2025, the popular Winter Lecture series will begin at Gettysburg National Military Park (NMP). Featuring some of the best National Park Service rangers and historians from across the region, the 8-week Winter Lecture Series of hour-long talks will examine a wide array of subjects related to the American Civil War and Gettysburg history.

From A.P. Hill, Frederick Douglass & John Brown, to the Battle at Mine Creek and much more, these lectures illuminate the different events and personalities of this pivotal chapter in American history. "Winter is an excellent time to visit the Gettysburg National Military Park Museum of the American Civil War," notes Christopher Gwinn, Chief of Interpretation and Education at Gettysburg National Military Park. "Through this lecture series we hope to offer visitors a reason to visit the Museum and Visitor Center and connect with the history of this special place and time in American history."

Of special note this year is a musical performance, inspired by Civil War poetry entitled "Marching On" by composer Ryan Mascilak and his ensemble. Additionally, visitors will be able to participate in a conversation featuring abolitionists Frederick Douglass and John Brown. Brought to life by living historians Nathan Richardson and Doug Dobbs, this special theatrical performance is done in partnership with the Lincoln Cemetery Association Project.

The Winter Lecture Series is held at 1:30 pm every Saturday and Sunday from January 4 through February 23, 2025, in the Gettysburg NMP Museum and Visitor Center. Inclement weather dates for select presentations will be on March 2 & 3. Limited seating is available on a first come – first serve basis. Free tickets will be available day of at the Gettysburg NMP Museum and Visitor Center.


