# A Deep Dive Into Proper Pool Water Discharge

As the end of the swimming season approaches, the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is committed to promoting the proper closure of swimming pools to safeguard stream health and aquatic ecosystems. Whether you're an individual pool owner, manage a public pool, or are part of a pool maintenance company, these crucial reminders and tips are designed to make a positive impact on our environment.

## Safeguarding Aquatic Life: A Responsibility We Share

The discharge of pool water and water containing chemicals like chlorine can pose a significant threat to aquatic life if not handled responsibly. It's imperative that we take appropriate measures to ensure these waters are managed in an environmentally conscious manner. The consequences of mishandling such waters can lead to detrimental fish kills and unsafe conditions for aquatic organisms.

## Guidelines for Responsible Pool Closure

When preparing to close your pool this season, remember to prioritize Pennsylvania's natural resources by adhering to these best practices:

- 🔊 **Coordinate with Local Authorities:** Before disposing of pool water, make sure to collaborate with your local municipal authority. Many areas, like New Freedom Borough, require residents to notify the Borough Office before releasing pool water into the sanitary sewer system.
- 🔊 **Avoid Storm Sewer Discharge:** Under no circumstances should pool water be drained into a storm sewer, as it will ultimately flow into nearby streams. This can introduce harmful chemicals and disrupt aquatic habitats.
- 🔊 **Prevent Street and Alley Discharge:** Never allow pool water to be discharged onto public streets or alleys. This water will eventually find its way into the stormwater conveyance system, potentially effecting the quality of local water bodies.
- 🔊 **Mindful Water Level Lowering:** If you need to lower your pool's water level, consider allowing it to drain onto your lawn. This precaution prevents excess runoff from entering storm sewers and minimizes its impact on the environment.
- 🔊 **Water for Responsible Irrigation:** In cases where a sanitary sewer system isn't accessible, consider using drained pool water for irrigation purposes. However, ensure that the water doesn't run off your property or enter storm sewers.

## Legal Implications: Compliance with Clean Streams Law

It's essential to understand that discharging swimming pool water into the Commonwealth's waters without a permit is a direct violation of the Clean Streams Law. To avoid legal consequences and protect both aquatic ecosystems and your own interests, adhere to responsible water disposal practices. Those found in violation of this law, including property owners and pool maintenance companies, may face prosecution and penalties for their actions.

As we bid farewell to another swimming season, let's remember that our actions have a significant impact on the environment. By following the guidelines provided by the Pennsylvania DEP, you play a pivotal role in ensuring the well-being of aquatic life and the preservation of our valuable water resources. # Proper Disposal of Rechargeable Batteries

Rechargeable batteries, such as those found in common household items like cell phones, tablets, toys, electric toothbrushes, tools, and remote controls should NEVER be placed in your curbside trash and recycling bins because they start fires. Please visit [Call2Recycle.org](http://Call2Recycle.org) to find a drop off location near you.

## Types of batteries

If the item contains any type of battery that cannot be removed, it should be taken to a battery disposal drop-off location.

### 1 Collect batteries

Check electronics. If possible, remove the batteries. If not, bring the whole device to the drop-off location.



### 2 Store safely

Store batteries in non-metallic containers (plastic, cardboard, or glass).



### 3 Drop off

Find a local disposal electronic store, or find a drop off location near you.

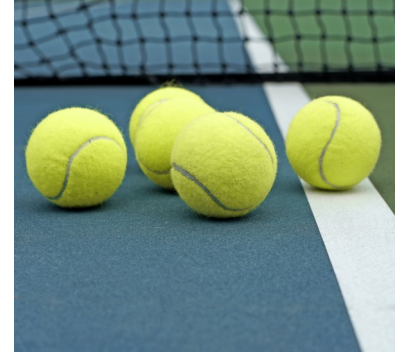

# Guidelines for Maintaining Streams

Maintaining stream banks is crucial for preserving the health of water bodies, preventing erosion, and protecting the surrounding ecosystem. Here are some general guidelines that property owners can follow to properly maintain stream banks:

## 💧 Leave a Buffer Zone:

Maintain a natural vegetation buffer along the stream bank. This buffer zone helps filter pollutants, provides habitat for wildlife, and stabilizes the bank. Native plants with deep root systems are particularly effective in preventing erosion.

## 💧 Avoid Disturbances:

Minimize disturbances within the buffer zone. Avoid clearing vegetation, dumping yard waste, or introducing non-native plants that could disrupt the ecosystem.

## 💧 Control Erosion:

Use erosion control techniques such as retaining walls, rock riprap, and planting grass or ground cover to stabilize stream banks and prevent erosion. These techniques help reduce the impact of flowing water.

## 💧 Limit Chemical Use:

Avoid using chemical fertilizers, pesticides, and herbicides near streams. These chemicals can easily be washed into the water, causing pollution and harming aquatic life.

## 💧 Manage Stormwater:

Direct stormwater away from stream banks to prevent excessive water flow and erosion. Install rain gardens, swales, and other drainage features to manage stormwater runoff effectively.

## 💧 Install Vegetation:

Plant native vegetation on the stream banks. Native plants have strong root systems that help bind the soil and prevent erosion. They also provide food and shelter for local wildlife.

## 💧 Avoid Construction Near Streams:

If you're planning construction on your property, avoid building near stream banks. Construction activities can disturb soil and lead to erosion and sedimentation in the water.

## 💧 Monitor and Address Erosion:

Regularly inspect your stream banks for signs of erosion. If you notice any erosion, take immediate steps to address it to prevent further damage. This might include installing erosion control structures or re-establishing vegetation.

Remember that each stream and its surroundings are unique, so it's essential to tailor your maintenance approach to the specific characteristics of your property. Working to maintain healthy stream banks benefits not only your property but also the larger ecosystem and the quality of the water resources.

## **Effective Tree Limb Collection:**

Are you dealing with tree limbs cluttering your yard? Our Brush Collection program accepts tree limbs up to six inches in diameter. This curbside collection service is carried out by the dedicated Borough Public Works Department. You can take advantage of this service on the second and fourth Tuesdays of April, May, June, September, and October.

## **Easy Process for Residents:**

To make the most of the brush collection service, all you need to do is ensure your tree limbs are curbside by 7:00 AM on the designated pickup day. This process ensures timely and efficient pickup. We kindly request that you refrain from placing brush in front of fire hydrants or blocking storm sewer catch basins, allowing for unobstructed access in case of emergencies.

## **What We Can and Can't Collect:**

While we're dedicated to helping you maintain a tidy property, there are a few guidelines to keep in mind. Please note that we cannot collect stumps, construction materials, or grass. Our focus is on accommodating the needs of residents by collecting tree limbs from the trimming of bushes and trees. This service is not intended for complete tree removal or site clearing.



## **Affordable and Accessible Tree Limb Tags:**

To facilitate the brush collection process, each collection requires a tree limb tag. These tags are available at the Borough Office for a nominal fee of \$15.00. This reasonable charge helps cover the costs associated with providing this service to our residents.

## **Be a Part of Our Clean Community:**

At New Freedom Borough, we're committed to fostering a clean and welcoming environment for all residents. The brush collection program is just one way we're working to enhance the quality of life in our community. ## BASIC RESIDENTIAL GUIDELINES

 Trash and recycling must be curbside by 6:00 AM on scheduled collection day, Friday.


 All waste should fit in the mobile cart provided.


 Bulk items should be scheduled through Penn Waste's customer service department at 717-767-4456. You may also schedule online at [www.pennwaste.com](http://www.pennwaste.com) and chatting with the chatbot Trina.

 Bulk items that are too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted.

 No construction debris will be collected curb side. Construction debris is material such as cabinetry, flooring or drywall that cannot be accepted curbside. Please contact Penn Waste for pricing on how to dispose of this material.

## PROPER CART PLACEMENT

 Place mobile cart with the lid handle pointing toward your residence.

 Place carts at least three feet apart from each other and mailboxes, fire hydrants, low hanging trees or shrubs, parked cars, or utility poles - so trucks can easily access the cart.

## Saving Water: Room by Room



### Kitchen and Laundry

- Simple practices that save a lot of water:
- Keep drinking water in the refrigerator instead of letting the faucet run until the water is cool.
- Wash fruits and vegetables in a basin. Use a vegetable brush.
- Do not use water to defrost frozen foods; thaw in the refrigerator overnight.
- Scrape, rather than rinse, dishes before loading into the dishwasher; wash only full loads.
- Add food wastes to your compost pile instead of using the garbage disposal.
- Wash only full loads of laundry or use the appropriate water level or load size selection on the washing machine.

### Bathroom

- Where over half of all water use inside a house takes place:
- Do not let the water run while shaving or brushing teeth.
- Take short showers instead of tub baths. Turn off the water while soaping or shampooing.
- If you must use a tub, close the drain before turning on the water and fill the tub only half full. Bathe small children together.
- Never use your toilet as a waste basket.

### Equipment

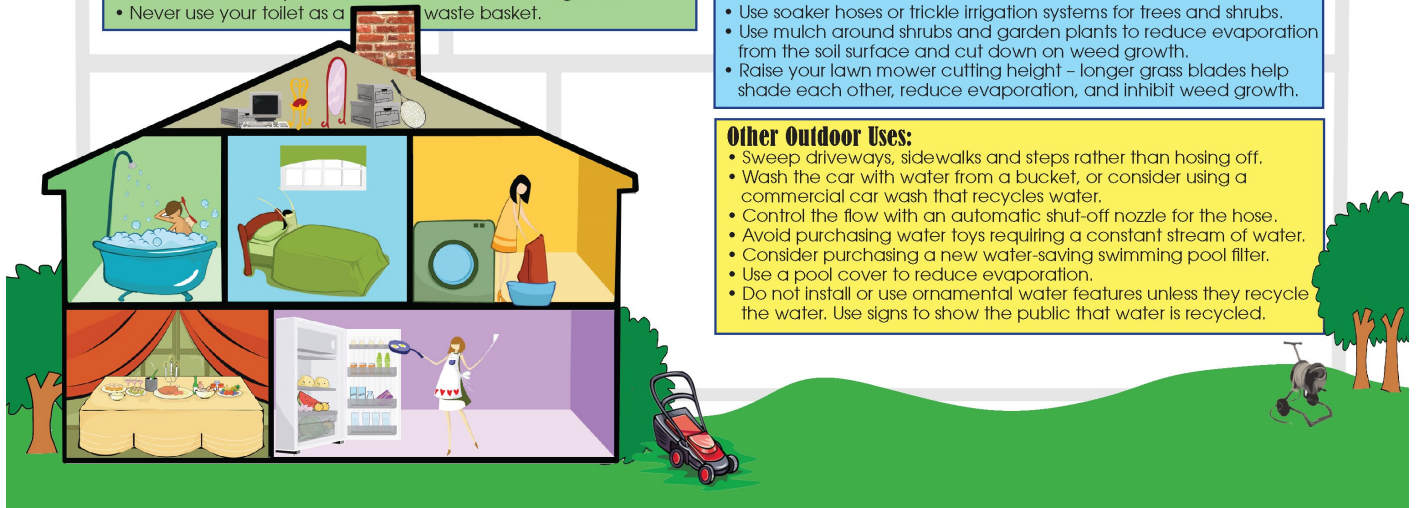
- High-efficiency plumbing fixtures and appliances save about 30 percent on water use and yield substantial savings on water, sewer, and energy bills:
- Consider purchasing high-efficiency toilets or a commercial dam.
- Install low-flow faucet aerators and showerheads.
- Consider purchasing a high efficiency washing machine which can save over 50 percent in laundry water and energy use.
- Repair all leaks. A leaky toilet can waste 200 gallons per day. To detect leaks in the toilet, add food coloring to the tank water. If the colored water appears in the bowl, the toilet is leaking.

### Landscape Irrigation

- Depending on climate, up to 75 percent of a home's total water use during the growing season is for outdoor purposes (During drought conditions outdoor watering restrictions may be imposed, so some of the following tips will not apply.):
- Detect and repair all leaks in irrigation system.
- Water the lawn or garden during the coolest part of the day (early morning is best). Do not water on windy days.
- Set sprinklers to water the lawn or garden only - not the street or sidewalk.
- Use soaker hoses or trickle irrigation systems for trees and shrubs.
- Use mulch around shrubs and garden plants to reduce evaporation from the soil surface and cut down on weed growth.
- Raise your lawn mower cutting height - longer grass blades help shade each other, reduce evaporation, and inhibit weed growth.

### Other Outdoor Uses:

- Sweep driveways, sidewalks and steps rather than hosing off.
- Wash the car with water from a bucket, or consider using a commercial car wash that recycles water.
- Control the flow with an automatic shut-off nozzle for the hose.
- Avoid purchasing water toys requiring a constant stream of water.
- Consider purchasing a new water-saving swimming pool filter.
- Use a pool cover to reduce evaporation.
- Do not install or use ornamental water features unless they recycle the water. Use signs to show the public that water is recycled.
